Is God Optional?

For us as a faith community, is God optional?

On the surface, that seems like a magnificently preposterous question. How could God be optional for a church? Isn't God why we are the church, why we go to church, why we do this thing we call church?

Well, of course. Yet what story do all the things we do as "St. Philip's Lutheran Church" tell? If someone was dropped into the middle of any given event, meeting, or gathering, would God be seen as central? Would God's presence even be acknowledged?

One of my greatest fears is that the church has become so much about the so-called "business of the church" that it has elbowed out the presence of God. Sure, we may toss off a prayer at the outset of a meeting, but it's often a perfunctory act before we can do the "real work." Yet if God is not at the heart of what we are doing as a church, why are we bothering to do it?

So the question needs to be constantly asked in every situation that arises under the banner of the church: where is God in this? That is, does this event/meeting/gathering glorify God and move us to love and serve our neighbors?

If so, how? If not, why are we doing it? Will God's world be a better place because of what we're doing? If so, how? If not, why are we doing it?

One of our Passionate Spirituality goals is to become a church where people openly and comfortably talk about their faith with one another.

One step to become a church where we talk about our faith with one another is incredibly simple, but will take incredible courage and fortitude: for every meeting to conclude with time to reflect on the question, "How did you experience God in this meeting?" It will be incumbent upon the leaders of meetings both to create an agenda that allows ample space for this conversation and to be brave enough to pose the question. I pray God will give the needed strength to our meeting leaders!

There are some groups and committees that have been taking the risk of actually reflecting on this question at the end of their meetings. Many insightful comments have been made and much faithful discussion

has occurred as a result. The whole shape of the work of any group or committee is completely reshaped when the Holy Spirit is invited in. It seems that this is, indeed, the "real work" of any committee, group, or team of St. Philip's: to pay attention to what God is up to and to follow where God is leading.

So, to answer that magnificently preposterous question, "Is God optional?" No, God is not optional. God simply has to be central to absolutely everything we as a church do. And if God is not involved in or if God is not central to something we're doing as a church, we should stop doing it immediately. And then we should pray and listen for God's voice.

Because the world doesn't need St. Philip's to be a social club or a service organization. The world needs St. Philip's to be the body of Christ, to witness to the saving grace of Jesus, and to be clearly and explicitly God's hands and feet out in the world.

May God grant us the courage to stop doing things that have nothing to do with living in Jesus' name and may God give us the faith to let it be known that God is at the very heart of absolutely everything we do! •

God's Work, Our Hands

Sunday, September 7th was "God's Work. Our Hands." Sunday —the day of service for the 10,000 congregations of the ELCA. Thank you to the 75 people who took part in eight activities planned for St. Philip's that day.

Their hands fed our community by making sandwiches for the hungry and homeless in the Twin Cities, making and serving dinner for those in temporary housing in Anoka County, and serving ice cream to seniors in Fridley.

Their hands made life easier for a widowed Fridley woman battling cancer by performing much needed yardwork.

Their hands kept our community members safe by installing smoke

detector batteries for low income families and seniors in Fridley.

Their hands made life more comfortable for those in temporary housing in Anoka County by painting a meeting room and installing ceiling tiles in the workout room.

Their hands made our community cleaner by picking up trash along twelve blocks of University Avenue and at a park near the high school.

Their hands helped comfort kids across the nation, who have been through disasters, by assembling craft kits to be used at Camp Noah. •

Have you ever thought about your voice? I hadn't thought about my voice for many years until I was trying to think of an article for this issue of The Friend.

ENOUGH

Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity

Stress. Anxiety. Fear. These words capture well the state of mind of many of us in America today. We have witnessed dramatic market losses, job losses, downsizing, bankruptcies and mergers. Every day seems to bring another piece of economic uncertainty.

A recent survey found that over three in four Americans are stressed about the economy and their personal finances. Half are worried about providing for their family's basic needs. Over half of respondents reported feeling angry and irritable, and reported lying awake at night worried about this. The report concludes that, "The declining state of the nation's economy is taking a physical and emotional toll on people nationwide."

Our nation is experiencing what many have described as the "American Nightmare." Increasing debt, declines in savings, lower income growth, and a volatile stock market are all a part of our economic insecurity. We live in a society that tells us "WE NEED STUFF" whether or not we can afford it or really even need it. We all have struggled with these issues at one time or another. They are important issues that we cannot ignore.

That is why, over the course of six weeks, we will be having a worship emphasis called *Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity*. During this time we will explore what the Bible teaches us about financial management through weekly worship and study (visit St Philip's website: splcmn.org for details about information and study information for the Stewardship Campaign). We'll hear expert advice and stories about what others have learned by working through financial challenges. Each week we will provide you with some practical tools you can use to assess your financial situation and develop a financial plan with a biblical foundation.

At the conclusion of the campaign, the congregation will have the opportunity to make personal commitments of our offerings to God through our church in the coming year. We will consecrate these commitments in the worship service on two consecutive Sundays. ("Consecrate" is a great word that means "to give ourselves to the Lord in a new way.)

We hope you will join us in the coming weeks as we look at how we can manage our financial resources and truly experience simplicity, generosity, and joy.
