Live Free by Pastor Joel Wight Hoogheem

One key idea we have encountered many times already in our journey through The Story is freedom. It is apparent that God continually seeks freedom for humanity and for creation. One of the grandest and most important stories of the Bible is the Exodus, the story of God freeing the Israelites from their bondage to slavery in Egypt.

God, it certainly seems, is in favor of freedom.

Just what freedom means, however, is of the utmost importance. Too often the operative definition of freedom that people have is that I can do whatever I want, whenever I want, however I want to whomever I want. This is a sadly undernourished idea of freedom.

I want, to whomever I want. This is a sadly undernourished idea of freedom and it is a definition that is not in line with God's idea of freedom.

Yet we're sold the lie that living like this will bring us security and happiness. Yet, as Scott Rodin writes, "Everything the world tells us will bring us happiness ends up putting us in bondage. The life we are so frantically pursuing is counterfeit. It is not the life for which we were redeemed in Christ and it will ultimately rob us of the freedom and joy for which we were created."

Our Christian faith leads us to a very different definition of freedom. In John 8, his disciples asked Jesus about freedom. In verse 36, Jesus answered, "If the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed."

Jesus is saying that freedom comes through being identified with him. Instead of the small, selfish definition of freedom so often held up by the world, Jesus offers an expansive picture of freedom: relationship with God, humanity, and creation. Freedom to love and serve. Freedom to laugh and love. Freedom from whatever holds you captive, be it slavery or the bondage to possessions.

So what does it look like to live free?

That's what we'll be looking at for several weeks, leading to our commitment weekend on November 14 & 15. Do we experience God's freedom? And do we respond to God's gracious freedom by acting with generosity and love? Do we live free?

You'll have the chance to, in Paul's words, "take hold of the life that really is life" (1 Timothy 6:19). Letting go and gaining life. Sounds like Jesus' definition of freedom to me.

Garage Sale Update

"This is such fun for my kids because I can give them a few dollars and they can buy whatever they want, without me having to tell them we can't afford it." That was one comment from a mother who attends the garage sale each year. She thanked us for doing this because she could afford to shop for items for her home and family. This is, in great part, why we work so hard to have this sale each year! We were able to contribute \$19,000 to benefit St. Philip's and the community.

Here are some of the ways we are able to put these funds to use:

- -\$10,000 is being donated to the Building for the Future Fund. Over \$3,300 will go to programs such as Alexandra House, Bikes4Kids, Cub Scouts, Mitten Makers, Coats for Kids, and the Fridley Middle School Reading program. Almost \$5,000 will assist St. Philip's programs such as Heritage Committee, Funeral Committee, WOW and Men's Work Crew, 55+ and <55 groups, choir, and tables for the lounge.
- PALS, an organization working with mentally disabled adults select items to be used for Christmas giving. The adults in their program get to chose items to be given to their families.
- Cross of Glory Lutheran Church in Moundsview takes items to be sold at their garage sale, which benefits their small church.
- -DAV took the remaining items and sold them, making \$804 which was donated to the Leukemia Society and to the auxiliary, which makes patriotic pillowcases for patients at the Veterans Hospital.

Remaining funds will be used to purchase additional, lightweight tables to replace the old, heavy ones we currently have, making it much easier on all those who have to carry them to and from the building!!

This sale provides a great deal for our church and for the community, as you can see. Please continue to support the wonderful people who work so hard to get items ready for the sale and then to clean up the church after the sale! It is because of them that this is such as success. So, "THANK YOU" to the men and women who worked so hard on this ministry. We appreciate your time and efforts.

Sunday in early September ice cream sundaes were served to approximately 60 seniors living at The Landmark and White Pine in Fridley.

Dinner was served to approximately 25 residents at Alexandra House and 50 residents at Stepping Stone. Also, walls were painted at both of these facilities, and ceiling tiles and lights were installed at Stepping Stone.

50 craft kits were assembled and delivered to Camp Noah, in St. Paul, along with birthday cards that were colored.

750 sandwiches were assembled, packed, and delivered to The Sandwich Project in St. Paul.

440 pounds of food and \$129 were collected at the Fridley Cub store and delivered to SACA in Columbia Heights.

Again, thank you. Your work, with your 160 hands, impacted thousands.



The Benevolence and Social Committee project "Coats for Kids" with \$1,000 from the Benevolence Committee designation and \$1,500 designated from the Garage Sale, \$250 from Thrivent along with a \$500 donation from the Walmart Fridley location we were able to purchase:

100 boys and girls jackets

32 snow pants/bibs

18 pairs of boy's boots

18 pairs of girl's boots

50 knit hats

29 hooded sweatshirts for middle school

This was a special project and we are so thankful and appreciative of the congregational support for this mission which benefits our local children who are in desperate need of warm outdoor clothing. A note was inserted in the pocket of each coat that said "Given with love from St. Philip's Lutheran Church". We delivered them to three local elementary schools and two middle schools on October 8, ahead of our predicted snow and cold snap.

A big thank you to all who planned and participated!



St. Philip's Disaster Relief Colorado Team #3 spent a week last month in the Fort Collins area, helping those that had been impacted by the 2012 High Park Fire and the 2013 Colorado flooding. They worked rebuilding three homes and the lives of the six people that owned those homes. They also worked at Buckhorn Camp, where the team stayed, that had been impacted by the fire.

A good share of their work was outside and the weather cooperated, so one team was able to do backfilling around the foundation and also install a large amount of siding, soffit and fascia on one home. Another team reconstructed a deck and built a greenhouse at one of the other homes. A deck at Buckhorn Camp was also reconstructed by a small team. At yet another home, one team worked inside tiling the shower and bathroom floor upstairs, while others sheetrocked, taped, and mudded in the basement. Another team worked inside at Buckhorn Camp helping to prepare meals and to paint many of the walls in Elkhorn Lodge. God's work, our hands.

The homeowners were very appreciative of the help the SPDR team members provided. One even served lunch (elk steaks and more) to the team helping him. One couple, who lost their home in the fire, gave those that helped them a book of photos and also a photo DVD showing their home before the fire and their rebuilding progress. In a short amount of time, the SPDR team members were able to make a difference in the lives of these people that have gone through so much.

The journey continues...back to Minot.

You have probably have seen the many construction activities at the church. Caused by the hail storm this summer, over \$97,000 of damage was identified. We learned a great skill for getting to know others - WHEAT. The acronym stands for where, hobbies, events, acquaintances and travel. These are all great topics for conversations when you're getting to know someone new!

This is just a glimpse of the Peer Ministry Leadership curriculum that we will be exploring this year and in years to come. We had a great weekend together with the youth and leaders of Nativity Lutheran Church of St. Anthony. Thank you to all of the youth and leaders who participated in this wonderful weekend! Please continue to keep us in your prayers as we continue to journey in ministry together here at St. Philip's and in our schools, families, friendships and in God's world.


