Going to church has been on my mind lately. Most of the time we think about attending worship services as something we are required to do. It's how we were raised. Or we attend because we hope to get something out of it ourselves. Maybe it's the sermon or the music. A week later I'll still remember that the sermon was good, but like it or not, I couldn't tell you many details about it. It's like going to the movies. SPDR Updates

Many thanks to those who helped make the lasagna dinner and auction fundraiser a huge success last month.

Thank you to over 40 SPDR team members that helped with the preparations on Saturday and the event on Sunday. Thank you to those that donated or bid on an auction item. Over 550 bids were made on over 200 auction items that

were donated by SPDR team members, friends, family members, and St. Philip's members. (Note: Auction items donated or won will not show up on St. Philip's members' giving statements.) 
Worship Task Force

We had our first meeting Tuesday, March 7. Our conversation was made up of answering the following questions:


- 1. Why did you feel called to serve on this worship task force?

Symbolism of the Paraments

During Lent they have a pattern of red lines, suggesting the challenges we face in our lives and the challenges Christ faced in his ministry on earth. The white lines on top remind us of the continuous presence of God. The lectern has a cross representing Christ's final challenge. It is tipped to imply it is being carried. 

Just Received: Letter from LCCN Bille Second Installment

Letter from LCCN Bille

This is the second installment of the letter to St. Philip's from Mr. Clement B. Dah, St. Philip's companion congregation LCCN Bille.

NEW VILLAGE HEAD

A new village head of Bille was selected and sworn in on October 31, 2015, after the death of the former village head. The new village head is a retired police officer, (Assistant Superintendant of Police). The role of the village head is to control traditional functions. The District Head oversees him and the other four village heads in the district.

SITUATION IN THE COUNTRY AND BILLE IN PARTICULAR

The very ugly situation in the country is that of terrorists' activities, the (North-East insurgency) popularly known as Boko Haram. For the past 4 years, these terrorists' activities have resulted in the loss of thousands of lives. Properties, churches, houses, markets, schools and hospitals were burnt down completely beyond repairs. Thousand of Internally Displaced Persons (IDP's) were camped in some states. The present government has taken some steps by building houses for those IDP's who are willing to return to their domains.

Glory be to God, the Army, the Air Force have taken a drastic steps in order to bring down their activities.

Recently the Army, Air Force, and the Vigilante/Hunters have succeeded in taking over the strongholds of the terrorist popularly known as the "Sambisa Forest" in Borno State. They have destroyed their weapons and dislocated them; and many have taken to their heels to neighboring states.

Apart from these terrorists' activities in the North-East region, there is the Niger Delta Militants in the oil producing state. The illegal militants, armed with sophisticated weapons, normally vandalized and destroyed oil pipelines and killed many innocent people in the area. This in fact has affected the economy of the country.

Also, there have been crises between the Fulani cattle rearers herdsmen and indigenous farmers which sometimes result in the lost of many lives.

However, with all these above mentioned happenings, Bille land has remained peacefully with its neighbors. Such disasters have not yet reached or affected Bille. We pray to God to forbid these things. We also pray the ugly economic situation in the country which affects almost every one as a result of insecurity will come and pass very soon. May you continue to pray for us always.

Days for Girls


