In a fast changing world, the one thing that remains constant is change itself! If your neighborhood is changing as quickly as mine is, I can only guess how the community around St. Philip's is changing. This time of year, the weather changes constantly. Transition time in the church also means change. One reason, we refrain from calling a new pastor right away, is that we need to live through the grief and loss of the past. The next reason is to have time to do a self-study. I am meeting with numerous members and friends of this faith community to listen to their story of this congregation. It has been obvious to me from the very beginning, that there are a lot of people who care very deeply about this church.

At the present time, I am in the process of putting together a Transition Team. The work of this team is to guide the members of St. Philip's as you look at your changing congregation and at the changing community, and through this process, develop directions of ministry that seem to be calling this congregation. This will take a lot of work for everyone, but it is from this work, that St. Philip's will be better able to discern what kind of leader it needs.

55+ will NOT meet in April but we suggest you check out the Annual Festival of Tables on Saturday, April 22, 2016 in the Fellowship Hall.



Just Received:Letter from LCCN Bille

St. Philip's received a letter from our companion congregation in Bille, Nigeria, updating us on the projects we jointly support in our Covenant relationship and sharing many additional aspects of the situation facing our Nigerian brothers and sisters in Christ. Included here are paragraphs specific to our joint projects. Watch for more excerpts in **The Friend** and check the Global Missions bulletin board for additional information.

Greetings to you in Christ's name.

I am pleased to have the opportunity to give you an update of LCCN Bille activities as follows:

1. NURSERY/PRIMARY SCHOOL

The LCCN Bille Nazareth Nursery Primary School has a total of 134 pupils, 73 in the pre-nursery and nursery, and 61 in primary grades one to four; 76 are boys and 58 are girls. There are seven teachers and one nanny at this time.

Facility: The school consists of two blocks with three classrooms and an office in each. The first block is complete with metal doors, and windows fixed with iron-rods. The interior of the first block has been plastered and the floor cemented; while the second block is yet to be done.

Health: The school has a first aid box which is always stocked with some emergency drugs to be given to pupils who experience minor ailments during the school period.

Toilet facilities: Pit toilets are provided for staff and pupils.

Water source: The nearest source of water is a public, hand-pump bore hole which was sunk by the state government 200 meters from the school area. The nanny fetches water from this bore hole and stores it in a large pot for pupils to drink.

2. EVANGELISM

Evangelist Pius Kasuwa has continued his evangelical work at Wasi-Daka. He has been assigned additional responsibilities in the absence of the district Pastor there. He hopes to visit LCCN Bille at the end of February.

Early last year, LCCN Bille received an evangelist named Godwin Sofiagi for internship; after he had completed his theological training at the Lutheran Seminary. He has been very active and helpful to the church; especially with programs for the youth.

She is specially trained in Conflict Resolution, Bridging, and Communications. Now is the time for us to gather ourselves as a community, affirm each other and all our blessings, and figure out how we can stretch ourselves to become more than we are and all we were meant to be . . . in Jesus' name.

This is one comment from a delighted child who received a colorful cozy hat and mittens created by the St. Philip's Knitters/Crocheters and the Knitters/Crocheters with Low Vision (a group from Vision Loss assisted by volunteers from St. Philip's).

The November meeting was a special time when all the knitted/crocheted items were collected and sorted for delivery to local schools and other organizations. Donations this year included: caps (444), mittens (57), scarves (30), shawls/lap robes (35), baby blankets (11), vests (18), bears (41), and sweaters (6).

Lap robes and shawls are comforting gifts for veterans and shut-ins. Vests are distributed by CEAP. Items for infants are donated to Crisis Nursery and Bundles of Love. Knit bears are distributed to local police departments who donate the bears to children who may be experiencing a stressful encounter during a police call. And the avalanche of hats, mittens, and scarves make their way to several schools in the metro area. (To read more quotes from recipients check out the community bulletin board by the office.)

Much of the yarn for these projects has been donated by congregational members and we can always use more...that is yarn and knitters/crocheters. All levels of talent are present. If you want to learn how to knit/crochet....this is the group for you. No sign up needed just stop by. This group meets monthly on the fourth Monday in Room 3 from 1:30 - 3:30 pm.
