## A Message from Pastor Christine

I love Psalm 19. In it we hear God's creation speak – The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky proclaims its maker's handiwork. Although they have no words or language, and their voices are not heard, their sound has gone out to all the lands, and their message to the ends of the world. This Psalm reminds us of how we can learn a lot from creation, including from animals. The following facts about geese are helpful for our own learnings when it comes to being a community of faith together.



FACT ONE: As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the birds following it. By flying in a V-formation, the whole flock adds 71 percent greater flying range than if the bird flew alone.

There's a lot I can do by myself; there's a lot I can do with a partner, but the power of what I can get done with a collective is quantum. People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they're going quicker and easier because they're traveling on the thrust of one another.

FACT TWO: Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front.

If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go and be willing to accept their help, as well as give ours to others.

FACT THREE: When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies at the point position.

With people as with geese, we are interdependent on each other's skills and capabilities and unique arrangement of gifts, talents, and resources. Indigenous societies call this interdependency the "good, true and beautiful."

FACT FOUR: The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those in front to keep up their speed.

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Everyone is welcome to worship at St. Philip's

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We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging – and not something else. In groups where there is greater encouragement against great odds, the production is much greater. Encourage someone else's core, encourage someone else's heart.

FACT FIVE: When a goose gets sick, or wounded, or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it is able to fly again or dies. Then they launch out on their own with another formation to catch up with the flock.

If we have as much sense as geese, we too will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.

## Symbolism of the Paraments

The primary purpose of the paraments (fabric pieces displayed on the altar, pulpit, and lectern) is to announce the season of the church year by their color. White is the color for Easter and its following Sundays. The basic white fabric has a pattern of shiny white squares across the upper portion to signify the presence of the light of Christ. There is a single large gold fabric with gold metallic overlay for the altar and a smaller piece for the pulpit, to set off the Cross and



Crown of the pulpit. Outside in the parking lot, there are white streamers hanging on the banners stands to represent the current season. These streamers change with each season.

### Letter from LCCN Bille - Third Installment

This is the third installment of the letter to St. Philip's from Mr. Clement B. Dah, St. Philip's companion congregation LCCN Bille.

#### WATER AND WELLS

Rivers and ponds are the main source of water in Bille. Its first shallow well was dug by the Missionaries 60 years ago. Today, any bore holes are sunk by the government and left to the community to maintain. From time to time, some of the bore holes break and it normally takes a long time before they are repaired.

However with the rapid increase of population, these bore-holes can no longer meet the demands for both drinking and domestic uses. The only shallow well dries up and produces less water during the dry season, forcing women and children to rise early to fetch water from wherever it is available.

Last year in the month of October, the state Government, using Courtesy Millennium Dev. Goal (MDG) funds, sunk a bore hole powered by a solar system between the primary school and LCCN Clinic. This is the source of water most families relied on now.

#### **FARMING SEASON**

The Bille people have always been predominately famers. Last year's rainy season brought a predicament to the farmers. The rainfall came earlier and ceased early. This resulted in a poor harvest and a shortage of foodstuff, causing hunger, malnutrition, poverty and hardship to many families.

Most farmers, who do not receive salaries from employment, had to sell the little produce they got from their farms in order to meet up with the family demands such as school fees of their children, medical care etc.

Some families will find it difficult to sustain food livelihood.


