


These young people have been eager and excitedly participating in the new Advocacy group here at St. Philip's in order to expand the food shelf ministry

I learned about a solar powered hospital in the middle of Africa that is able to serve people where no electricity can reach. There were speakers, workshops, tours, new friends, and all of this to broaden my faith. There was power and beauty in this gathering of smart, knowledgeable, and faith-filled women. Singing with a few hundred of them was my favorite activity of the weekend.

The next conference will take place July 16 - 19, 2020 in Phoenix, AZ. It would be an amazing experience to show up with a group of ladies from St. Philip's Church from Fridley, MN. Who's with me?

## President's Column Mike Youngberg

In June I did a shout out to several groups at St. Philip's who do a great job of reaching outside the congregation to serve those who are not members of St. Philip's.

This month I'd like to recognize two groups who serve St. Philip's congregation within the walls of the church itself. For years, the Women on Wednesday (WOW) and the Men's Work crew have helped to keep the building clean, attractive, and in good shape. Because they work on Wednesday mornings, many are not aware of their work at all. Perhaps you've wondered how the glass in all the windows stays clean or how the grass gets cut.

Katie, our custodian, does a wonderful job of keeping things running smoothly, but we would need several custodians to do everything that needs to be done.

WOW's primary responsibility is maintaining the Sanctuary. They do the big things like vacuuming and dust mopping the floors, but they also sharpen pencils and make sure hymn books and Bibles are where they belong. The altar and chancel area is dusted, and the Prayground picked up and organized. I feel bad for the spiders around the Sanctuary. They don't stand a chance. Besides their work in the Sanctuary, WOW keeps the kitchen and chapel clean and ready for use. The entries to the building are also on their task list. Glass is cleaned and door handles and plates are shined. All of this happens every week.

The work of the Men's Work crew is not nearly as predictable. In July alone they cleaned the outside campus by removing dead trees and all the trees in the willows along Moore Lake. All the brass kick plates on the doors were removed and polished. Several individual office air conditioners were removed, fixed, and replaced. The old hot water heater was removed and a new one installed. The labor costs alone saved the church between six and ten thousand dollars on the water heater. Add to all of this set up for major events like the Garage Sale and Festival of Tables. Each month brings a new set of challenges.

The little tasks we take for granted are performed by the real human hands of people we know. Without these dedicated servants, St. Philip's could not function the way it does. It would cost thousands of dollars to pay others to do the work of these volunteers.

I have had the opportunity to work with these groups on Wednesday mornings. The work is important and the fellowship is wonderful. New workers are always welcome. If you're interested, show up at 8:30 am at the church on Wednesday mornings. You'll even get a treat at break time.

## St. Philip's Disaster Relief Fall Trips



The St. Philip's Disaster Relief will be sending a team to Eureka, MO October 1 - 7, 2017 to assist in the rebuilding effort from the damage caused by the two major floods - in December 2015

and in May 2017. The Meramec River in the cities of Pacific, Eureka, and Valley Park, MO rose to over 35 feet, setting new records during both events and damaging thousands of homes and businesses.

The SPDR team will leave St. Philip's Sunday, October 1 and arrive in Eureka in the early evening. The team will be

working under the guidance of the Salvation Army and St. Mark's Lutheran Church. Lodging will be at Eureka United Methodist. The team will work in the area Monday through Friday and depart Saturday morning arriving home in the early evening.

#### Sanctuary Paraments Pentacost And The Time After Pentacost


On Pentecost Sunday, red was used as the color of fire to represent the tongues of fire descended on the crowd in Jerusalem. In contrast to the color scarlet, Pentecost's red is a bright color.

Now, in the time after Pentecost, green is used to indicate our growth in faith as we follow the teachings and ministry of Christ. The green paraments are used over six months of the year, the most amount of time of any of the liturgical colors. The altar and lectern paraments suggest tree forms through the use of straight twill woven structure. There are small red accents which can be seen as blossoms of fruit, appropriate for the seasons in which the lessons concentrate on growing in faith.

The new banners hanging on the wall behind the altar were created and completed by three members of the congregation: Becky Becker, Sara Bruce, and Joan Kruse. The various greens symbolize the different ways we grow in our faith and represent the Holy Spirit working within us: large, bold, sparkly, narrow, quietly – but all swirl around together, as we do in our daily lives. Our growth in Christ, inspired by the Holy Spirit, affects each of us in different ways, but all to the glory of God.

#### Library Celebrates the 500 Jubilee Year of Reformation

This year marks the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation



of the Christian Church. It was on October 31, 1517, that Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of the castle church in Wittenberg, Germany.

This act sparked the remarkable change that affected the entire world. Perhaps it has been a while since you were interested in this man Luther whose name we bear as Lutheran Christians. This would be a fine time to become reacquainted the dynamic leader and his efforts to reform the church.

St. Philip's library group has assembled a collection of recent books on Luther and the Reformation. Stop in soon and look for these publications.

Brand Luther: 1517, Printing and the Making of the Reformation by Andrew Pettegree. When Luther posted his 95 Theses, he was unknown. Within months his ideas spread across Germany because of the printing press. Luther became a great communicator.

*Luther: Man Between God and the Devil* by Heiko A. Oberman. This is the definitive biography.

Luther's Fortress: Martin Luther and His Reformation Under Siege by James Reston, Jr. Though the Reformation began in 1517, the movement didn't really get underway until 1521. Already excommunicated, Luther was branded a heretic. This edict carried a death sentence. Under the protection of Frederick, Duke of Saxony, Luther was hidden at the Wartburg Castle.

*Martin Luther* by Michael A. Mullet. This fast-moving biography provides an understanding of Luther's influence on Germany and the rest of Europe.

Martin Luther: What Should I Do? This book by Catherine Mackenzie is for children. As well as worrying about getting something to eat, Martin worried about getting to heaven. God's Word showed him to put his faith in Jesus.

Mother of the Reformation: The Amazing Life and Story of Katherine Luther by Ernst Kroker. Katherine was 26 when she married Martin, age 42. Their marriage was successful and set a high standard for marriage and family life.

October 31, 1517: Martin Luther and the Day That Changed the World by Martin E. Marty. For the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, Martin Marty, preeminent scholar of religion, has written this meditation on Martin Luther's 95 Theses.

A Place to Stand: The Word of God in the Life of Martin Luther by Gene Edward Veith, Jr. The Word of God gave Luther his place to stand. Five centuries have passed since Luther's trial at the Diet of Worms and his famous "Here I stand" declaration.
