



Theme For Lent

May Lent not just become a routine, where we don't even have to think about it... but a time for us to awaken, practice, and reflect on the meaning of Lent in our lives.

SPDR Lasagna Dinner and Auction Fundraiser

Sunday, February 11 is the annual SPDR fundraiser and will again be a lasagna dinner prepared and served by the Disaster Relief team members and a sealed bid auction with many wonderful donated items.

The dinner includes salad, lasagna, breadsticks, dessert, and beverages. Dinner seatings are at 4:00 and 6:00 pm. Tickets are \$10 for adults and \$5 for children ages 5-12 (under 5 are free.) Sunday, January 28 is the last day to purchase tickets for the dinner.

The auction items will be available for bidding after worship services on Sunday, February 11 and at the dinner. The auction items include hand crafted items, gift baskets, tools, jewelry, housewares, electronics, various gift cards to merchants and local activities, and much more.

New to the auction this year is a 7-day Hawaiian stay in a condo on the sunny side of the island of Kauai - with a value of \$1200. This timeshare condo is owned by a SPDR team member (and Mike Anderson's former boss.) The unit (remodeled four years ago) sleeps up to four people with one bedroom and a sleeper sofa in the living area. There is a full kitchen, one bathroom, washer and dryer. This is a RCI Gold Crown Resort that features 3 swimming pools and spas, mini golf, tennis court, fitness center, BBQ area by the pools, a rooftop deck and garden. The resort has 176 condominiums on seven acres overlooking Lawai Beach. The area is excellent for snorkeling, surfing, bodyboarding, swimming, and beach parties.

The minimum bid for this great item will be around \$750. The winning bidder would be responsible for resort fees and taxes (approximately \$175) and transportation. (A rental car is recommended and airfare is generally around \$700 per person.) The owner will work with the winner to reserve a week sometime in July through October, 2018. (Flexibility on the week or month is important.)

Dear Churches in Ministry with us:

We pray that you have had a meaningful Christmas experience and that the grace of God has blessed you and your families during this season.

Late in November, the Japan Evangelical Lutheran Church had its national pastors' gathering in the city of Nagasaki. This event was held at the Urakami Catholic Church. The atomic bomb that fell on Nagasaki (August 9, 1945) exploded a mere 500 meters from the cathedral and the church was completely destroyed. The cathedral was replaced in 1959. Now a beautiful new building is standing in the place where once only ruins of war could be seen. It holds up to 1,500 people.

On November 23, there was a joint Catholic-Lutheran worship service to remember the Protestant Reformation, that began exactly 500 years ago. It was both an honor to be able to participate in the service as well as an inspiration to see so many Catholic priests and Lutheran pastors sitting side by side, remembering not only the reformation, but the mutual coming together once again 500 years later as a community of believers in Christ. In many ways, this service represented a healing of differences between the two churches as well as a recognition that we are truly brothers and sisters in Christ. The church was filled to capacity, with many members of our Lutheran churches traveling to Nagasaki to be part of this historic worship service.

On the day before the actual joint worship service, we had a little time to look around Nagasaki. I went to the Nagasaki Peace Park, which is very near the Urakami Catholic Church. A statue has been erected there in 1955. It is almost 10 meters high. It is said that the statute's right hand is raised upward to point to the threat of nuclear weapons while the left arm is extended out symbolizing peace.

While it was wonderful to be able to be part of this joint worship, we still live in a world that is divided in so many different ways. The threat of destruction and war seems to be right at our doorstep, and yet we are called by Christ to be instruments of God's peace. May all of us be able to participate in bringing words of healing, peace, forgiveness and reconciliation to those who live in our respective communities.

We are called to be beacons of light in a dark world. In the letter of Paul to the Romans we read, "Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with brotherly affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Never flag in zeal, be aglow with the Spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in your hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer." (Rom. 12:9-12)

May we all be able to be worthy representatives of God to a world in need of healing and peace.

I send you greetings from the confluence town of Numan in Adamawa State, Nigeria that is the location of the national head office of the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria.

Thank you very much for your message and commitment to continue to support the mission work of the LCCN through partnership with the Bille Congregation.

Our daughter Rubiyasima, my wife Ruth and I remain very much grateful for the opportunity to be part of St. Philip's in Fridley. We have very fond memories of our time together and continue to pray for the ministry of the congregation. Since we left in 1998 Ruth has not had the opportunity to return to the USA. I only came back to Fridley once. We are eager to visit. Indeed so eager that we wish its this Christmas.
