Christmas is coming quickly this year. Some of us will panic about this wondering how to get everything done. Others will take a deep breath and give thanks that they have been given yet another Christmas to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

There have been changes for many in our congregation. Some have lost loved ones. Others have moved to facilities for more care. There are those who will not be able to be in worship on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day and they will miss this.

We team up to volunteer as gift wrappers for the kids at the Kinshoppe event held at St. Philip's and again at Barnes & Noble as part of a fundraiser for a non-profit theater group she is part of. I pull out my Christmas t-shirts and holiday headbands and we tag team to wrap gifts while sharing the joy of the season with others. No challenge too big – I've wrapped round snow saucers, basketballs, and last year, I managed to wrap a box that was almost as tall as I am! Through the simple act of wrapping gifts for others, we've been blessed to meet some great kids at Kinshoppe and have some wonderful conversations with customers at Barnes & Noble. It amazes me the discussions you have and the connections you make with folks while they wait the 10 - 15 minutes it takes us to wrap all their gifts. Those volunteer gift wrapping sessions have now become one of our favorite things to do each holiday season.

Fall Trip #2 St. Philip's Disaster Relief

Before they had even returned from the fall trip, several team members were making plans for a return trip to Montgomery County, TX to continue the work in one particular house that was flooded by Hurricane Harvey. The family of eight had been displaced for over two years and their house was far from inhabitable. In mid-November, a team of 14 members made the journey back to Texas and spent six days working in this house.

In October, the living room floor had given way and replacing that was a priority. The rotted joists and supports were removed and replaced, new sub-floor was installed, followed by laminate flooring. New kitchen cabinets were ordered in Michigan by a SPDR team member and hauled to Texas. They were installed along with countertops, the sink, and the appliances. Three team members spent most of their days almost completing rewiring the house, installing light fixtures, switches, outlets, and a new service panel. The bathroom floor was rebuilt and flooring installed, walls were framed and sheetrock, the tub and surround were installed, and the water was hooked up. Work was also done on the exterior of the house, doors were installed, trim was put up, rooms were cleaned, and much, much more.

The team stayed an extra day than previously planned to get as much completed as possible. On Saturday evening, the whole family arrived to view all of the work that had been done. It was a fun and emotional time as they went from room to room checking out the work SPDR had done and the furnishings and appliances provided by the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.

Thank you to the 28 team members in October, the 14 team members in November, all of the SPDR supporters, and our partners in the Episcopal Diocese of Texas for making a difference in the life of this family.

As the journey continues, let us not weary of doing what is good. (Galatians 6:9)

Did You Know? Food & Clothing Shelf



The Food & Clothing Shelf of St. Philip's Is Moving the Outreach to the Community to Amazing Heights.

Community Distribution Facts:

- We have served 1,637 visitors since opening in September of 2017.
- We served 98 visitors in October 2019.
- We have distributed 20,970 pounds of food in 2019.
- We distributed 409 pounds of clothing in October 2019.
- We partner with the Wednesday community suppers.
- We partner with St. Philip's Benevolence Committee with the Thanksgiving baskets.
- We partner with SHIP (Safety Health Improvement Partnership) who has provided us with a commercial refrigerator and freezer, a commercial grade scale, a commercial work table and three produce racks.
- We partner with Second Harvest Heartland Food Distribution and by the end of October have placed 46 orders of food.
- We purchase the following items which we are unable to purchase from Second Harvest: coffee, taco seasoning, ranch dressing, thousand island dressing, toothpaste, and can openers.

Fundraising Facts:


- We will be promoting, "The Reverse Advent Calendar" for a second year.
- CenterPoint Energy has given 876 pounds of food and \$674.
- CenterPoint employees have given \$295 of donations which have been matched.
- Love that Olive has donated 158 pounds of food from a sponsored food event. We have received over \$1,000 from eight donors, including the St. Philip's Endowment Committee, Garage Sale Group, and Parish Fellowship Committee (Parish Fellowship has also donated over1,000 pounds of food collected in their fundraisers).
- The Cummins Corporation donated 36 left-over Thanksgiving bags of non-perishable food items in 2018, approximately 900 pounds of food.
- Harold Kurtz has donated funds from the sale of his most recent book, "Letter to Phil." More books are available in the Food & Clothing Shelf. Harold is generously donating the proceeds of those books to the F&CS also.
- Many St. Philip's members have included the Food & Clothing Shelf in their monthly philanthropy giving.
- In February the ELCA will be partnering with St. Philip's by exhibiting three mosaic art pieces.

Community Supper Volunteers Needed Through Advent



Update From Tokyo, Japan



Dear Friends in Christ:

Recently Japan got a new emperor and we wanted to share a little about that event.

Emperor Naruhito formally proclaimed his ascendancy to the throne on Tuesday, October 22, in a centuries-old ceremony attended by dignitaries from more than 180 countries, pledging to fulfill his duty as a symbol of the state.

The first Japanese emperor born after World War Two, Naruhito acceded to the throne when his father, Akihito, became the first Japanese monarch to abdicate in two centuries after worrying that advancing age might make it hard to perform official duties. Naruhito, whose name means, "a man who will acquire heavenly virtues," became the 126th Emperor of Japan in May, the latest in an unbroken line that stretches back 14 centuries.

As servants of Christ, we are here to share the Gospel as Paul did in front of the Areopagus in Athens. Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him - through indeed he is not far from each one of us. "In him we live and move and have our being." Acts 17:22 - 28

On another note, in the last two months, Japan has encountered very severe typhoons (hurricanes) and there has been extensive flooding, destruction of property, and the loss of many lives. The intense rain (up to 40 inches) in some places over two days, has created havoc and fear and much anxiety for a significant number of people. In three storms there have been 170+ deaths. The vast majority is from drowning. Over 74 rivers overflowed their banks.

Please pray that:

- Through various TV and radio programs about Christianity, the Japanese can see how Jesus gives deep meaning to our lives.
- We may be effective witnesses for Christ here in Japan
- Consolation and hope may be given to those with personal and property loss in the recent severe weather.

We give great thanks for your support of us and our ministries here in Japan!


