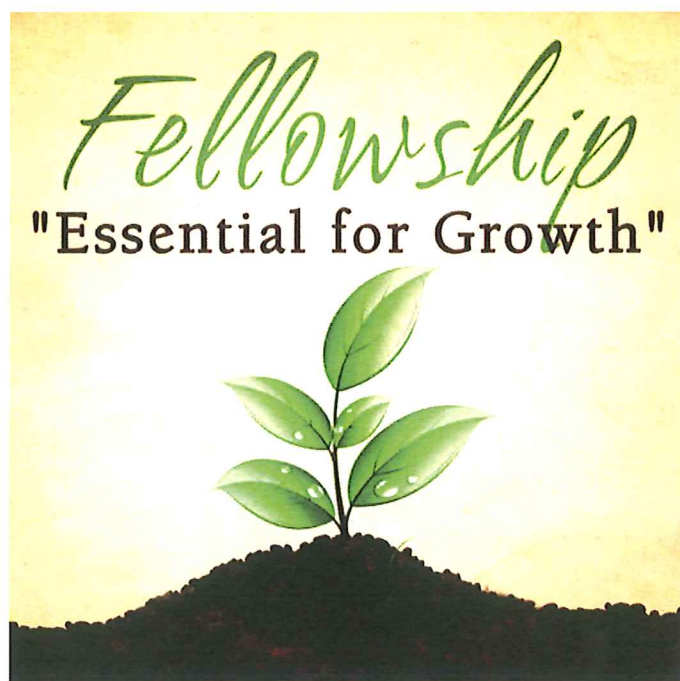

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Everybody is busy traveling, working in the yard, and enjoying the great Minnesota outdoors. It's the middle of Summer. We are also in the middle of congregational discernment on building up a culture of change here at St. Philip's. Now you might say, "but Pastor, aren't we in the middle of figuring out what our fall worship times should be?" Yes, that's part of it, but only a part. If we make a change to worship times and change nothing else, we are setting ourselves up for trouble down the road. We need a positive culture of change. "Well, what does that mean?" you say. It's a congregational culture that does not move too quickly, so that people experience chaos all the time. It's also a culture that doesn't move too slowly, so that the congregation gets stuck. It's a culture of change where the congregation evolves as needed to reach out to a changing community and to meeting the needs of the members as those changes as well.

The proposal to change worship times is a part of a greater culture of change. As I write this, I am in the middle of visiting as many of the members as I can. At their homes, out in the community, and at church. I'm visiting individuals, families, and groups. The visits have been wonderful! They have been very positive. It is truly a delight to get to know folks better. It's been a great blessing to hear the experience, wisdom, and ideas of the people of St. Philip's. There is so much passion, commitment, and hope here that I am very excited about where God will lead us in the future. There is a very strong consensus developing for the worship time choice. I'm looking forward to sharing more about this at our congregational family meeting on Sunday, July 28. See you all there.

Leadership

Board of Administration June Highlights

- New Congregational Pictorial Directory – pictures are scheduled onsite Wednesday, August 21 – Saturday, August 24; and again on October 29 - 30 and November 1 - 2.
- Handicap pew arrangement evaluation at the May 19 forum received approval by those attending. Additionally, it was agreed upon to expand the handicap spaces available to the right side of the Narthex. There was an overwhelming approval for the change process that included initial discussion, trial, evaluation, and decision. Property & Grounds will set a future date for the next pew modification move.
- Youth Director update – Mandy Bond, provided by InterServe, increased to 16 hours per week the middle of June. She continues to mentor and work alongside Connie. She is also working with Pastor Matt focusing on adult ministry and new member orientation.
- St. Philip's website platform will no longer be supported in 2020; staff are investigating alternatives. The phone system will phase out by the end of 2021.

Dear SPDR Team and Supporters,

A local pastor spoke of a group who had come down from their homes to help Galveston recover from Harvey and the last time they were here, she compared them to a spoon. She said, "When we find ourselves in a situation that is going to be difficult to get out of, we call it being 'in the soup'. So many people who have been through a disaster like Harvey have been 'in the soup' for a couple of years now with many feeling as if they may never get out. They needed the right utensil. A fork could not get them out, but it could pick through their water - soaked lives and pull out a few things to salvage. They needed a knife to cut through moldy walls and downed trees, but it would not lift them out. Then came the spoons, gathering them together, lifting them up; families, homes, neighborhoods. Being the spoon is a humbling experience. After the knives do their job and the forks have salvaged what they can, we need spoons - all kinds - to lift us out of the soup so that we can get on with our lives and be the spoon for those who will someday find themselves in the soup."

We thought that was a fitting description for what a volunteer does, so the first recipients of the "Spoons Full of Love" award is St. Philip's Disaster Recovery Team in gratitude for their tireless work pulling Harvey victims out of the soup and into recovery. 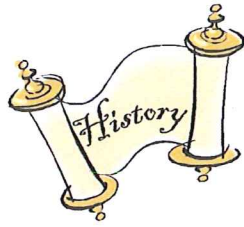

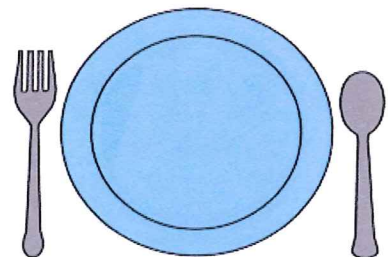
