Ruth 1:16-17

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God our Father and our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The season of Lent is upon us. It is a time for reflection, renewal, and return to God. This year, we are going to use the book of Ruth as our guide through the season. One of the great themes of the book is Chesed - it means loving kindness and faithfulness. In the book of Ruth, we find people acting out Chesed in their lives during some very stressful events. We thus learn what it means and what it looks like. We also learn that Chesed is an essential part of the character of God. The book is not considered a great theological work, such as Paul's letter to the Romans, where he painstakingly lays out the means of God's grace and salvation. Ruth takes a different path. Ruth uses a story, a narrative approach, to teach great theological lessons. It uses a story of love between people to teach us about the love of God.

I invite you to come to worship on Wednesdays in Lent, the 12:00 pm or the 7:00 pm service, so we can explore together the theme of Chesed:

Love - Kindness - Faithfulness.

The season of Lent is upon us, and so are our First Communion classes! At St. Philip's, we understand that children vary in their readiness for communion, so we don't have a specific age that we require children to be, but we do encourage they participate in the classes by grade 6.

"How do I know when my child is ready?" Parents are encouraged to consider the following about their child's readiness:

- Is your child asking questions about Holy Communion?
- Is there a verbal desire being expressed to receive communion?
- Does your child participate in the worship service? For example: sings along in worship, says the Lord's Prayer, and Apostles Creed.
- Does your child talk about feeling left out when other family members commune?
- Does your child understand being wrong and being forgiven?

First Communion classes will be held on Wednesday, March 27, April 3, and April 10. Parents/guardians attend the classes with their children. We will gather at 6:00 pm, grab dinner, and head to the Lounge to eat while we learn. Children who participate in the classes will receive their First Communion at our Maundy Thursday Worship on Thursday, April 18 at 7:00 pm. I cannot wait to go on this Faith journey with these kiddos.

The snow totals started slowly in 2019, but we sure made up for it starting in February. For the first part of the month we couldn't seem to go more than a day or two without a good size snowfall. It's lovely to watch if you're gazing through a big picture window. It doesn't look as picturesque from inside a car during rush hour traffic though.

Our recent back to back storms and deeply cold weather have been challenging. Repeated school and business closings and too many instances of scary road and driving conditions. Not enough resources to help those in need as they struggle to stay warm, safe, and properly nourished. The weather and conditions have caused even more isolation than a typical winter. We hunkered down and weathered the storms, only popping out during the good patches and then heading back into hibernation. Our cozy blankets and options to binge watch drew us inside, making it so easy to become isolated from each other and the world outside our doors.

In Hebrews 10:24 - 25, it says, "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

Snow and cold can cause isolation, but there are many other things that keep people isolated. Economics, fear, anger, age, depression, health issues, and lack of connections. God wants us to find ways to connect with each other and the world beyond the mountains of snow. No matter the time of year, we are challenged to find ways to lend a helping hand to those in need. Find ways to spur each other on, move each other toward love and good deeds. What can we do from inside our cozy, warm homes, now and when the weather warms? Call a neighbor you haven't seen recently and check in. Sew some warm hats, blankets, or mittens and donate them to local charities or schools. Check your closets for clothing and equipment that could benefit the visitors to the St. Philip's Food & Clothing Shelf. When you buy gas, purchase a gas gift card and leave it in the church office. Write an email or letter to support a cause you believe in. Pray for each other. Then when the storms inevitably pass, we can gather together and connect again, face to face.



#### New Books Added to the Library in February!

St. Philip's Library has added some new books recently. Two of these are by a well-known and acclaimed fiction writer, one is a thrilling WWII memoir, and another - ripped from yesterday's headlines.

Barbara Kingsolver has written an unusual tale of two families who lived in the same house in Vineland, NJ, in two different centuries. *Unsheltered* follows the families who each live in their own precarious times. This is a story of courage and inspiration during a time of social change.

Clock Dance by Anne Tyler tells the story of Willa Drake, who can count on the fingers of one hand the defining moments of her life: There's her mother's disappearance, her unexpected marriage proposal, her young widowhood, and the phone call telling her that her son's ex-girlfriend has been shot.

The WWII memoir, *Out of the Depths*, is a thrilling true-life story of survival after a shipwreck, told by Edgar Harrell, USMC.

Pediatrician and author Mona Hanna-Attisha tells the story of being poisoned by lead water in Flint, MI. What the Eyes Don't See is a story of crisis, resistance, and hope in an American city.

## Lent From *Bread For The Day*

Lent is a forty-day journey to Easter. Christians keep company with Noah and his family, who were in the ark for forty days; with the Hebrews, who journeyed through the desert for forty years; and with Moses, Elijah, and Jesus, who fasted for forty days before they embarked on the tasks God had prepared for them.

During Lent Christians journey with those who are making final preparations for baptism at Easter. Together, Christians struggle with the meaning of their baptismal promises: Do you reject evil? Do you believe in God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit? Do you believe in the church, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the dead?

The disciples of the Lord Jesus are called to contend against everything that leads them away from love of God and neighbor. Fasting, prayer, and works of love - the disciplines of Lent - help the household rejoice in the gifts of baptism: God's forgiveness and mercy.
