# What is Your Apple Tree? Matt Flom, Pastor

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. Proverbs 3:5-6

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

What is your apple tree? We are still working our way through the COVID pandemic, cities have burned, and the nation is in an uproar. We are on the cusp of a history making election. People are anxious; people are worried. Martin Luther looked at the great calamities of his day and said, "Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree." Everything may look hopeless, but God is not done with us yet and He expects us to carry on His mission in this world. Planting an apple tree is a great analogy for our mission. Planting a tree is an act of faith. Will it survive? Will it take hold? We can't control the weather and drought and wind can destroy any tree. Planting a tree is signing up for a lot of work. Trees need fertilizer, water, and pruning. They must be looked after to flourish well over a long time. Planting a tree is a gift to future generations. An apple tree will benefit the planter after a few years, but the best rewards will come to the following generations.

We have a choice. We can let fear and doubt consume us so that we only turn inward and grasp on to what we have and how things are as tightly as we can. Or, we can put our future into the hands of the living God in a radical act of trust and worship. What is your apple tree? In the midst of all the upheaval in this generation, what is God calling you to do as an act of public faith and service. What is St. Philip's apple tree? What public acts of faith and mission is God calling us to do? This time of great upheaval has created an opportunity for us to minister to a hurting community of people. God wants to use us to feed the hungry, clothe the cold, speak out for the downtrodden, and build His kingdom. In a time of hate, chaos, and fear God calls us to live and speak love and grace. It's time to roll up our sleeves, we have apple trees to plant.

In the same way, we trust that God is with us. God's presence does not depend on us, we depend on God. And so, we wait with hope, a sure and certain hope, in God's providence. And we pray.

Gracious God: Give us a calm heart in the midst of that which we cannot control. Hold us in peace. Give us wisdom and strength to endure any difficulties we are now suffering. Help us to trust in your goodness and love.

### Coats for Kids

Thank you to everyone who donated to the Coats for Kids project. On Wednesday, October 21 we were able to supply the Early Childhood Center, Hayes Elementary, Stevenson Elementary, Fridley Middle School, and Fridley High School with 75+ coats. St. Philips is doing God's work!

### Food & Clothing Shelf

The Food & Clothing Shelf has continued to serve the needs of the hungry. We have been preparing for cool/cold weather and are making plans to gradually and safely make the move inside. The Board of Administration approved our use of the curbside entry Door 3 Foyer to use as a clothing area so people can shop inside for clothing while we continue our curbside food distribution. As it becomes too cold for comfortable curbside distribution we plan to move back inside in the Food & Clothing rooms. With the help of a grant from the Minnesota Department of Human Services Office of Economic Opportunity (MN DHS OEO) and Hunger Solutions Minnesota we will be able to have a monitor station and laptop computer at our normal entrance at Door 12 for visitor sign-in. We'll also have a monitor station with scale for weighing at the clothing room Door 11 (which will be used as an exit door). One person at a time will be allowed inside the food room to choose the foods they prefer and then will move through the clothing room where they'll shop if they wish and exit when done. One volunteer will staff the Food & Clothing room and will hand the visitor refrigerator and freezer items that they prefer. Once they exit another person will be allowed in. Three volunteers will make sure face masks and safe distancing rules are adhered to.

We have so many heartwarming visitor stories to share. Numerous homeless men have been gathering warm clothing and much needed easy open food. We've had visitors walk up with a wagon for curbside pick up. We've had visitors on bicycle. A woman drove up in a motorized wheel chair holding an umbrella to shield herself from a light rain. We loaded her chair full and she drove off with joy.

With the help of the generous donations from the congregation during COVID-19 and the amazing amount of free grant food from 2nd Harvest Heartland we are in a stable position to sustain this wonderful ministry to the needs of the community.

## "God's Work. Our Hands"



Like so many other things, "God's work. Our hands." Sunday was different this year. It looked different without Fellowship Hall full of tables and supplies staged for several activities. It sounded different without the conversation and laughter as St. Philip's members worked side-by-side and without the music and singing for the residents of The Landmark and White Pine care facilities. It even tasted and smelled different without the ice cream sundaes and a thousand bologna sandwiches.

Unable to gather as in the past meant "God's work. Our hands." Sunday would have to go mobile. 55 kits were assembled for members to take home and work on. They were returned and the finished items were blessed during worship on Sunday, October 4. The end result was:

- 15 fleece blankets for those that visit the St. Philip's Food & Clothing Shelf.
- Around 1,000 bandages for Global Health Ministries to be shipped to health clinics overseas.
- 30 diapers, also for Global Health Ministries, to be included in their Newborn Kits.
- Almost 100 hand decorated notecards one for each resident of The Landmark and White Pine.
- 84 pairs of mittens for the St. Philip's Mitten Makers to sew and then distribute to area schools.

Although it was different this year, some things remained the same. St. Philip's members continue to love and serve their neighbors, whether they are right down the road or across the ocean, using their hands to do God's work, whether that happens at St. Philip's or in their homes. Thank you for that!

### Thanksgiving Baskets

The Benevolence Committee will be giving 75 Thanksgiving baskets to members of the community and food shelf clients. Given the times in which we are currently living, many of you may want to donate money and have us purchase items for the baskets, which is a great option. Any monetary donations should be designated to, "Thanksgiving Baskets." For those who wish to purchase items and drop them at the church, we will need: Boxes of potatoes and stuffing, vegetables, fruit, large packages of Jell-O, pudding, or dessert mixes, peanut butter, cereal, macaroni & cheese, tuna, hearty soups, chili, or stew. Please bring any donations to the church no later than Wednesday, November 18.

## **Giving Trees**

Yes, it is almost that time of year! Our Christmas giving trees will be displayed starting. Wednesday, November 25. We will be donating to two organizations this year. Hope4Youth and In Love, Word and Deed are organizations giving assistance to homeless men, and homeless teens. Gift lists will be published in the E-News and gifts maybe dropped off at church in the collection boxes under each tree. If you would like to give money and have us shop, we will be happy to do so. Make sure you make a designation on your check, or in the envelope, that you are donating to, "Giving Trees."

- *Trouble I've Seen* by Drew G. I. Hart. Herald Press, 2016. Leading readers toward Jesus, the author offers concrete practices for churches that seek solidarity with the oppressed and are committed to racial justice.
- Deadliest Enemy by Michael T. Osterholm and Mark Olshaker. Little, Brown, 2017. Drawing on latest medical science, case studies, and epidemiological lessons, this book explores the resources and programs we need to develop to keep ourselves safe from infectious disease.
- God and the Pandemic by N. T. Wright. Zondervan, 2020. The author examines various responses to the coronavirus and invites the reader to carefully consider the Bible, Christian history, and the teachings of Jesus.
- *Truth and Hope* by Walter Brueggemann. Westminster Press, 2020. This is a collection of essays in which the author provides a guide into biblical teachings that speak to our present age.
- The Spirit of Hope by Jurgen Moltmann. Westminster Press, 2019. This is theology for a world in peril. Hope is challenged by ideologies and global trends that deny hope.
- When Kids Ask Hard Questions edited by Bromleigh McCleneghan and Karen Ware Jackson. Chalice Press, 2019.
   This is a collection of 30 essays from a diverse group of young parents, pastors, and experts on a range of tough issues: suicide, sexuality, gun violence, and divorce on how to have faithful conversations and tackle tough topics.
- How to Help Your Anxious Teen by Jessica Thompson. Harvest House, 2019. The author helps parents and teachers discover the surprising sources of their teens' worries and fears.


