Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God, our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The season of Advent is upon us and that means Christmas is around the corner. As I write this, the COVID-19 epidemic is still raging and there are many restrictions on how we can gather. If things continue as they are, extended families and friends won't be able to gather for holiday meals, parties, and caroling. This is quite an emotional blow for so many folks. We all want to be with family and friends for the holidays.

The extent to which this affects us, however, is completely within our own control. As life keeps teaching us, there are so many things we can't control. What we can control is how we react to our circumstances. It's a choice, and perhaps a hard choice at that. I offer these humble ways to positively react to a difficult Advent and Christmas time. Stay in touch the best way you can. For some this means a Zoom call for others, the good old-fashioned phone call. We can still spend some time with family and friends even if we are in different places. Pick a few holiday traditions and focus on them. Make and have a special meal. Sing Christmas carols as much and as often as you want. You don't have to go all out but decorate a little for the season.

The most important suggestion I have is to truly focus on the coming and birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Make or get an Advent calendar. Light a candle each Sunday and celebrate the Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace each represent. Set out a nativity set in a prominent place and add a couple of pieces each week to represent the different people as they enter the story. Advent is a time of holy preparation for the coming of our salvation. As Mary sang, "My soul magnifies the Lord." Let this be our song as well.

As you read the words of this favorite Advent hymn, sing them also. The tune is solemn, but full of hope.

Come thou long expected Jesus Born to set thy people free;

From our sins and fears release us; let us find our rest in thee.

Israel's strength and consolation, Hope of all the earth thou art.

Dear desire of every nation, Joy of every longing heart.

Born thy people to deliver, born a child and yet a king!

Born to reign in us forever, now thy gracious kingdom bring.

By thine own eternal spirit, Rule in all our hearts alone;

By thine all sufficient merit Raise us to thy glorious throne.

I have always had an Advent wreath on the table where I eat my dinner. Over the years I've gotten new ones as the old ones have worn out. The one I have now is in the form of a star and has a little platform. Years ago, members gave me a small nativity set and it fits on the platform perfectly.

An Advent wreath helps me to pass the days before the birth of Jesus. I use three blue candles for hope and waiting and a pink candle for the third week. A candle of joy. I grew up in a Catholic family and the word for the pink candle of joy was "gaudete." The pink candle serves as a reminder that the waiting is nearly over. Jesus is coming soon. Soon I will light the fifth candle, a white candle, a Christ candle... on Christmas Day.

But before all of this begins I must clear off a place for the Advent wreath and candles and nativity scene. My bottles of eye drops and contact lens paraphernalia, a small jar for toothpicks, and other treasures must be put aside for a time. This little bit of clean up reminds me that I must get things ready for Jesus in my soul as well.

My soul has become very cluttered in the past year with the election and the pandemic. It's been easy to forget that Jesus will come as Jesus has promised. But now the pink candle waits to be lit and this favorite Advent hymn to be sung to a different tune.

Here is a little known fact about this hymn. It can also be sung to the hymn tune for "Love Divine All Loves Excelling." Try it. Let it lift your heart.

Advent blessings of hope to you all, and though it seems dark and far away, a blessed Christmas as well. The light of the birth of our savior will overcome the darkness one morning ray at a time and soon the light of Christ's love will bring you the joy you seek!

# Desk Project

Unfortunately, because of COVID-19, St. Philip's Disaster Relief (SPDR) team members have been unable to travel to help rebuild the homes and lives of those that have been impacted by the many recent natural disasters. But they have figured out a way to help those impacted by the COVID-19 precautions for schools and to utilize the skills of team members who have a passion for helping others. They built simple, folding desks for students that are distance learning and need a place in their home to do that. A total of 50 desks were initially requested by school administrators from Fridley, Spring Lake Park, and Columbia Heights and should be completed near the beginning of December. Much of the work was done with small groups working three or four hours outside in near freezing temperatures but neither heat and humidity in Houston or freezing temperatures in Fridley stop the SPDR team members from helping those in need. 
## **Annual Fundraiser**

With winter almost upon us, what we really need is something good to read. Below are recommendations from the St. Philip's Library Group:

#### **Best Sellers**

Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens. G.P. Putnam's Sons, 2018. This best seller is part mystery, part coming-of-age-novel, part love story, and outstanding natural description of the North Carolina coast.

*Educated* by Tara Westover. Named one of the best books of the year, *Educated* captures Westover's exceptional upbringing and her struggle to exceed the limitations of her birth and environment into a better life.

#### Recommended by Twin Cities Area Church Library

Ella Minnow Pea (or LMNOP) by Mark Dunn. This satire is written as a series of letters about language. Ella is a girl living on the fictional island of Nollop off the coast of South Carolina, named after Nevin Nollop, author of the immortal phrase, "The quick brown fox jumps over the lazy dog." The result is hilarious.

*Trains, Jesus, and Murder* by Richard Beck. This is the gospel according to Johnny Cash who sang about and for people on the margins. His music between light and dark makes Cash an authentic theologian of country music.

#### More About Viruses

The Great Influenza: The Story of the Deadliest Pandemic in History by John M. Barry. Spellbinding, terrifying, fascinating, and sobering all describe this book as it provides us with a precise model in confronting the present epidemic.

*Virus as a Summons to Faith* by Old Testament theologian Walter Brueggemann. He uses Biblical reflections in a time of loss, grief, and anxiety.

## Update from Tokyo Jim and Carol Sack

#### Dear Partners in Christ,

We thought we would share with you a little about Japan and the wonderful four seasons that have a major impact on the people and the culture. This is especially true for nature and how Japanese respond to the luscious views that God has created here in this mountainous country. Japanese affinity with nature reminds us of the Creation Story in Genesis. We read, "Then God said, 'Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it.' And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good." As missionaries we have many opportunities to share that our God is the one who made all of creation, including the beauty that is found in Japan.

The four seasons are admired and quite distinct from one another. Each one has their own representative foods and activities that coincide with that season.

As you already know, Japan is a very densely populated country with many cities packed with lots of people. That may be one reason that nature plays such a big part on the psyche of the Japanese. No matter how populated a city you dwell in, just seeing the beauty of Mt. Fuji, whether from the air or on land, is an emotional experience. Besides Mt. Fuji, there are approximately 17,000 mountains here, depending on how you define "mountain". When it snows, these peaks can offer a splendid view of God's creation.

Beginning with spring, the cherry (sakura) trees are beloved by Japanese and God puts on a show that is hard to match. The blossoms are around for about 10-14 days and they provide a metaphor of our own human temporary existence. This season is also about beginnings, as it is the start of a new school year and business cycle. This season is known as a time to have flower-viewing festivals, spending many hours under the gorgeous cherry trees, eating, and drinking.

Once the cherry blossoms fade from the scene summer seems to quickly take over a place on the stage. First bringing the rainy season (tsuyu) and then the very high heat and humidity that can become almost unbearable. During summer there are many lively festivals that often come with huge and colorful fireworks. The Japanese will dress up in traditional cotton robes (yukata) and many will participate in traditional Japanese dances (odori). Very thin noodle dishes (somen) are served cold and dipped into a delicious watery sauce. When it gets very hot you also may be tempted to eat eel, which is very popular.

After the heat of summer, autumn brings some of the most pleasant weather during the year. Refreshing breezes and crisp sunny days are a delight to partake in. The changing colors of the leaves can be breathtaking as the Japanese may take long walks or hikes in nature. Some of the foods associated with fall are chestnuts, various kinds of fish, and expensive mushrooms. The pleasantness can often extend well into December.

However, winter does indeed come and in the mountainous areas can bring many meters of snow. Many will enjoy the fun of skiing or sledding on the white stuff, while others are content to stay at home and gather around a low table with a heating element underneath and covered with a quilt (kotatsu). This is the time of year to drink hot tea and eat many Japanese Mandarin oranges called (mikan).

As you can tell, each season provides a number of activities where we can gather and enjoy time with our family and friends. Group activities have been a traditional part of being here in Japan. Of course, now with Covid-19, some of these cherished activities and gatherings have been cut back. Even going to church to worship together has been affected with a number of hurdles to overcome. Yet the Word of God is still preached and it is heard either in person or through some form of internet connectivity. We look forward with eager anticipation to the time when we can go back to gather freely with one another and not have to worry about effects of this pandemic.

Whether we are in a time of pandemic or not, as created beings of God, we still are able to venture out into God's wonderful creation called nature and enjoy the seasons graciously provided for ourselves and our souls.

May each of you find a special moment or object in the created world this day.
