Come and See Matt Flom, Pastor

46 Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." John 1:46

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God, our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. "Come and See" was the title for the first sermon preached at the new congregation of St. Philip's Lutheran Church back in 1958. Come and See is our motto. Come and See is how we invite people into the family of God. Evangelism is one of the seven purposes of the church. We seek to connect people to Christ just as Philip sought to bring Nathanael to Jesus of Nazareth.

In the time of COVID-19, many folks have given up on evangelism. They think that because we can't invite people to come join us for worship in the Sanctuary, that we should just wait. Folks, now is the time to invite people into a life giving relationship with Jesus Christ. People are hurting, disconnected, and anxious about the future. People need God in their lives. How then are we supposed to evangelize? We use the tools at hand. We use Facebook, the website, the E-News, the app, the phone, and good old fashioned paper and pen. Like and share our videos. Offer to have a discussion of a study after watching it separately. Let people know how we are reaching out and serving the community and include links to our website. If people sound interested in what we are doing, send them the E-News or invite them to download the app. Calling people and just checking up on them is wonderful. If you haven't seen someone since things shut down, give them a call and let them know you were thinking of them. If they express a lot of worry, offer to pray for them. I also want to encourage you to write to people. In this ever increasingly electronic world, a handwritten note is a rare and precious gift. If you don't like electronics, then handwritten notes are your way to shine. Keep connecting, keep praying, and keep inviting folks to, "Come and See."

Remember what Luther said, "Even if I knew the world would go to pieces tomorrow, I would still plant my apple tree."

As I make my calls to members of St. Phillips, I hear stories of love. Love of neighbor. Love of family. Love of God. Love of their church.



I know a few packets of these new seeds can give me hope. I've seen the strength of other seeds planted in our church garden. Perhaps you will be able to visit some of these newcomers this summer. Hasta La Pasta anyone?

Update from Tokyo

Dear Friends in Christ: I (Carol) am by DNA make-up a night owl, always have been. For decades now I have envied my husband who will work like a beaver all day, and at 9:30 pm declare, "think I'll head for bed." And in no time he is blissfully "sawing zzz's," only to awaken bright-eyed and bushy-tailed for the tasks ahead on the next morning. Me? It seems like my creative juices for ministry are just gearing up around 10:00 pm. Many hours remain in the night, so I will tend to keep going until I run out of gasoline, at which time I can plop into bed and dive into overdue sleep without further ado. Morning is a reluctant reality.

But miracles can happen.

Twenty years ago, when I was being trained in the field of pastoral harp, (harp and voice at the bedside of the dying) Philipp, one of my colleagues, told me he would awaken and play the harp before the sun came up. This was his practice time, but also his time for meditation. My imagination delighted in his comment, but for me, I knew this would be the classic case of "the spirit is willing but the flesh definitely won't pull through." Nevertheless through all these years I never forgot the inkling.

My spiritual discipline usually follows the Psalms. This fall, when I came across Psalm 57:8 ~ "Awake, my soul! Awake, O harp and lyre! I will awake the dawn" ~ Imagination finally managed to be incarnated into a new morning ritual, after all these years! Nowadays I set the alarm for the predawn hours and get up even about an hour before Jim. Unbelievable!

In the silence I make my requisite cup of caffeine, then turn on a stained glass lamp to offer minimal but inviting light with which to tune my harp. A harp needs to be tuned every day, often several times a day. A harp out of tune is not a "joyful noise." So before anything, this is what I do in the darkened morn. As I tune my harp, I remember that I too am out of tune. It happens without effort that I get out of tune. I may not even realize that I am out of tune, but surely those around me will hear the unjoyful noise that ensues. So this tuning is a wonderful spiritual practice in itself.

Then I sit at the harp and see what notes of worship will come forth. I never know from day to day what will exude from the strings. Sometimes my voice joins in, sometimes it remains in the resonances of the harp strings alone. But it is a rich, and to me, miraculous way to begin the day with and in prayer.

This Christmas, services in Japan were done in a new way. Out of reverence for the Lord and reverence for life, churches held services observing a holy distance between congregants as we quietly celebrated the coming of our Savior. In this unique year, something manifested that I had not anticipated. Because of a care to limit the familiar singing of the carols, but with the indispensable need to include the voice of adoration through music, I was asked to play the harp at six different services in five different churches between December 20 and 27. It was a deep privilege to offer the voice of praise through pastoral harp.

May we awaken the dawn of this new year, with a new and joyful song to the Lord, through whatever "harp and lyre" is at our fingertips! Joy to the World. (The Lord has come!)
