31 What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? (NRSV) 31 What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? (ESV) Romans 8:31

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God, our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This month is the one-year anniversary of the pandemic shutdown. It would be the understatement of the decade to say that things have changed. As disciples of Jesus how are we to take all this into account and more importantly to move forward in building up God's kingdom? The Bible verse at the beginning is one that is familiar to many. Romans 8 is often used at funerals and Romans is St. Paul's greatest work. Our denomination uses the NRSV translation for worship readings. It is quite good, but as with all translations from the ancient language, there is a bit of interpretation. It's the version you've heard read in church. The second version is a bit different and, in this case, I think it's a bit more accurate. It also helps us talk about our situation. When tragedy or difficult times come, we need to talk it through in order to deal with our emotions and help us get a handle on things. We have a lot to say *about* these things. This processing is important and necessary for our well-being. However, we can't stay in that place. After a while, we need to deal more actively with our new life situation. There is a bumper sticker which read, "Stop telling God how big your problems are and start telling your problems how big your God is." What then shall we say *to* these things? What then shall we say to the world?

We are children of the Heavenly Father and heirs to eternal life in God's kingdom. Christ's death on the cross defeated sin, death, and the devil for all time. The true battle has been won. We live in the in between time from when Christ's resurrection to His return to complete all things. I would not downplay the struggles, hurts, and tragedy of this age one bit, but I will never give up the true reality of Christ's ultimate victory on the cross. We need to trust in God, hold tight to each other, and do our part. We continue to live out our theme for this year as Luther said, "Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree."



The Practice of Love Eric Nelson, Associate Pastor

Greetings and warm wishes to you this March,

We have been the church together (while frequently physically apart) for a year now. A year in, we find ourselves in a variety of places: some still in comfort while some struggle, some at peace and some in turmoil, some things the same as a year ago and some things quite different. I don't presume to assume everyone's experience, but we do need to declare that God is still present and we are still church together in this time.

We all know that as much as much social gathering seemed to come to a stand-still, events of the world and life did not come to a stand-still. The world keeps moving. Much has happened locally, nationally, globally, and personally over the past year. We continue to recap and discuss the events of note in our local, national, and global news. Yet, there are things going on for each individual. For many, these personal experiences have been lived mostly alone, lacking many of the normal supports one might have.

In the gospel of John, after Jesus washed the disciples' feet in his last Passover with them, he said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

It has been a wonderful act of love for one another to physically distance, wear a mask, and take precautions in love for one another. We ought to continue this practice of love. However, I also want to encourage an additional act of love for the neighbor. Let us be present for one another. As a pastor and part of the church community, we also declare that the mental and spiritual health of our neighbor deserves love and care. Jesus stepped into love for the disciples that involved making himself a servant and giving everything he had in love.

And Jesus calls us to go out to show the love he has shown us to our neighbor. Jesus' love?! Love that sacrificed everything. Only in Christ's love can we then step out into this call.

So, a year in, I plan to continue showing love in precaution for the health of my neighbor, but I also want to share a message of hope in care of mental health of the neighbor. As pastors, Matt and I will continue to be with you in whatever you are experiencing. Phone call or in-person visit. You are a beloved child of God and do not need to be alone. Just as faithful servants continue to feed and cloth people at St. Philip's and in the community, we continue to care for the other ways we need to be fed.

Whatever your personal experience, God and God's community of believers is still here for you. Support each other in notes, phone calls, safe in-person conversations, and whatever ways possible. Jesus sends us out to love each other in every season. Though pandemic is still different for us, we know that Christ is still in this with us, now and always, and call us to be the community of believers together.

With what should I come before the Lord? What does the Lord require of you? But to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? Micah 6

My point here is that there is no one way to do worship or ritual. God must be smiling at our innovations knowing how much we want to be faithful.

In the same way, there is no one way to do our Lenten practices. Each of us should ponder what God would have us do as a spiritual discipline. A spiritual discipline is meant to get us our of our comfort zone and open our hearts to Jesus. More prayer time? OK. Meditation? Great. Taking time to visit a neighbor or a loved one? Wonderful. Giving to a food or clothing shelf? Outstanding. The beauty of this arrangement is that you can't really do anything wrong so long as your heart is in the right place.

What does the Lord require of you these 40 days? Be blessed in your practices and spiritual disciplines to be a blessing in the name of Jesus. Amen.

Amending the Soil or the Soul? Lynette Thompson, Garden Group

How do you make something better? Well, for example, a cook may add ingredients, such as salt, garlic, Worcestershire sauce, or numerous other spices to a food preparation. A mother may add a Band-Aid, a kiss on the forehead, or a hug to her injured child. A teacher may add words of praise or a gold star sticker to a student's work.

Gardeners also like to make things better. In a vegetable garden, there may be desires for bigger tomatoes, sweeter corn, and juicier melons. Minnesota's short growing season brings temptation to plant at the earliest but safest spring date. Gardeners comfortably announce when seeds and starter plants are in the ground. Their anticipation to the harvest then begins.

But have you ever encountered a less than desirable result to a project? I am somewhat embarrassed to admit my lack of proper preparation in some of my ventures. Even worse, I have knowingly skipped steps so I can get to the end faster.

In the world of horticulture, there is active discussion about our soil resources. Can you imagine not having enough soil to grow food as we know it today? Developing new varieties of vegetables and fruits which can feed more of the world's population is useless if there is an inadequate soil base to support such growth. As boring as it may sound, soil deserves our attention.

How will I prepare the soil in our church garden? A soil test can reveal pluses and minuses already present in the ground.
