
Taking Church With Us Matt Flom, Pastor

The LORD sits enthroned over the flood; the LORD sits enthroned as king forever. May the LORD give strength to the LORD's people. May the LORD bless the LORD's people with peace." -Psalm 29:10-11

I lived for seven years near the Red River and became accustomed to floods in the spring. In fact, within my seven years in the area, the Red River recorded four of its top ten highest flood crests for the area. The number one crest was during my senior year of college. Campus had been evacuated and I was completing my time in student teaching in a nearby town. With only two days left until the school I taught at began spring break, I foolishly decided I would remain in my off-campus house and then retreat to my parents' home after that. Arriving back to the house after teaching the day campus had evacuated, I found myself driving through water up to the bumper of my vehicle as I pulled onto the street in front of our college house. My plans changed. I packed up, ready to teach for the next day, and ready to leave the house until it was wise to return.

Many had done plenty in preparation for the flood, but the waters could not be fully held back by human force. Too many know this reality. People have floods, storms, and unforeseen circumstances beyond their control change life at minimum for a season and many times changed for the rest of their life. We face these floods in a pandemic and all else we face together and on our own. At times it can overwhelm us how little we can seem to do to deal with these forces around us. Even as flood waters subside, as things approach normal, we know, things are different.

Yet, we have these words from Psalm 29. "The LORD sits enthroned over the flood." These floods that cannot be held back, these waters that will flow where they will and will sweep up whatever is in their path – the LORD sits enthroned unmoved and unshaken in the midst of this. These forces of destruction do not have the power to harm, destroy, or change our God. And our God does not sit enthroned, idly watching as we struggle. No, the LORD gives strength to the people and blesses the people with peace. God is our source of strength and peace and these are things we are able to share in the world. I will always remember the kindness of others in the midst of the chaos. They still had strength and peace to share. We don't gloss over the difficulty, but instead we share the strength and peace that we are given, knowing that our God is unshaken and is with us to give the strength and peace to move forward. As we gratefully move forward, we do so knowing that the past year and a half has touched each of our lives differently. We honor this in our neighbor as we continue to show God's grace and love. And we remain grounded knowing that our Lord sits enthroned above any storm we endure, as our ever present bringer of strength and peace to share with ourselves and our neighbors as we weather storms and recover as community together. God's strength and peace to you and your neighbor!

Nashville Trip St. Philip's Disaster Relief Team



The beginning of June marks 20 months since the last SPDR long-distance trip to Houston, TX following Hurricane Harvey. It is time for SPDR to get back on the road and help rebuild homes and lives.

In late March, there was severe flooding in Tennessee with 23 counties receiving a FEMA disaster declaration. SPDR coordinators recently met via Zoom, with staff members of the ELCA's Eastern Tennessee Synod Disaster Response. They explained the recovery efforts that are currently in place and how they are gearing up for volunteers in the Nashville area.

Plans are being made to send a team of around 12 people to Nashville, most likely in August. The safety of the SPDR team members is important so COVID precautions will be in place as needed. It is highly likely that all team members will be required to be fully vaccinated.

Update from Tokyo Jim and Carol Sack

Dear Friends in Christ:

When Jim and I committed to missionary service in 1982, we did so with the assumption it would be a life-long commitment; and so it has been. Our marriage was young, our first child was 10 months old, and our life's calling lay ahead of us. Our four parents were in their sixties, still vibrant, but even then I remember a still small voice asking, "What are we going to do when our folks become vulnerable with age?" I remember not being able to answer the question, and feeling grateful that my brother was living close by to our folks. Yet, the question remained unresolved, with a lingering twinge of something that felt akin to guilt.

Then, about twenty years down the lifeline, to my own surprise I ended up in a modality of palliative care, end-of-life ministry. At the center of this ministry is the idea of presence, what we sometimes call "with-ness" to persons who are in this very special time, the closing of their human story. So, I could not help see the irony of leaving my own parents' side while "lovingly caring" for God's children on the other side of the world. A classic case, all too common in professional ministries, of "the shoemaker's kids going barefoot."

My Dad is now with the Lord. Mom, who just turned 104 on May 1, has said so many times, "I pray that when my time comes, you will be here to hold my hand." Over the years I kept telling her, "I pray that, too, Mom."

In January Mom had heart issues and was put into hospice care. Pandemic or not, I knew that *this* was the time to offer "with-ness" to my own mother, for my sake, if not for hers. So from the beginning of February I have been living with Mom in her Minneapolis seniors' apartment. (Lo and behold this is largely doable because of the pandemic, some of my normal ministry activities having been put on hold, and others possible by long-distance. What an unexpected confluence of events.)

A few weeks ago, Mom called for me. When I went in, it appeared that "This is it." When I said I would call the nurse she said, "Oh, no need for that, I'm not afraid of dying!" Then she looked at a beloved prayer shawl she had recently received and said, "Oh, what a shame, I won't be able to use this much longer now!" (I could not help chuckling just a little in spite of the adrenaline surge of the moment.) I called my brothers to FaceTime with them. Then, remembering Mom's wish, I held her hand. I wanted to sing to her, wondering what to sing...and just then noticed a song book open on her bed. It was open to, "Precious Lord, take my hand, lead me on, help me stand, I am tired, I am weak, I am worn. Through the storm, through the night, lead me on to the light, take my hand Precious Lord, lead me Home."

Mom survived that episode. It was our practice session. But I now sing this song every night as the prayer the Lord gave for this gracious time. I'm not sure when the Lord will call Mom home, and I'm not even sure I will be here to be holding her hand. But that song has assured me that it's OK because He, the Precious Lord, will be holding that hand at that time. It is enough.
