Which Commandment is the Greatest of All?



Meals on Wheels

History is in the making once again for St. Philip's!

Forty-eight years ago, we were a part of the beginning of Meals On Wheels for this area. In July of this year, Meals on Wheels is merging with a company called Impact Services. We will continue doing the same great service as in the past.

Since July of 1973 when Meals on Wheels began for our area, St. Philip's has had nine volunteer coordinators who call members to drive for six to eight routes during one week, six to eight times per year. A big thank you to: Paula Cable, Jan Dean, Joann Haugen, Meredith Hille, Eva Jeppson, Jane Kuykendall, Barbara Lundberg, Beth Terpstra, and Dawn Young.

Members volunteer an hour or two of their time each time they drive and deliver to six to 10 stops on their route. Some drivers deliver one time that week, some deliver several times, and some take the whole week. Over the years this would be about 3,000 routes. Since most routes are delivered by two people, we have provided over 6,000 drivers! Amazing what a couple of hours at a time can add up to! A huge thank you to all the members who have given of their time to touch the lives of unknown numbers of folks in need of food. We sure wish we could thank all of you individually!

A very active space can now be found on the church property. It's the outdoor vegetable and perennial flower garden, a sunny and inviting area located next to the Chapel and Food & Clothing Shelf rooms.

You likely won't hear human voices or human produced music or singing. You may however hear water or buzzing bees that stop by for a drink of nectar.

Feel free to enter this space and consider the silent sounds that surround you:

Roots are tunneling below ground. Leaves are emerging from tender stems for beans, squash, and cucumbers. Raspberries are racing to plump themselves. Cloves of garlic are expanding. Onions are learning how to form layers around their slim stalks. Tomatoes are choosing their colors and shapes - red, yellow, orange - cherry shaped, oval shaped or are aiming for the coveted "big boy" status.

You can call your time in this garden "taking a break", an experience in mindfulness, a stroll of curiosity, a COVID-19 safe activity, or whatever you choose. We welcome all visitors and encourage returns.

2021 Trips St. Philip's Disaster Relief Team



Plans are moving forward for two disaster relief trips this year! After a record-breaking year for hurricanes and other disasters in 2020, coupled with limited volunteer resources, the need for rebuilding help is greater than ever.

The first trip is scheduled for Tuesday, August 24 to Wednesday, September 1 and will be to help those that were flooded from heavy rains in the Nashville area of Tennessee in late March. The team will travel 1 ½ days on each end of the trip and stay six nights at Faith Lutheran Church in Lebanon, TN. Team members will be responsible for their hotel and meal costs while traveling. The SPDR funds will pay for gas for vehicles, and the lodging and meal costs at Faith Lutheran. Building skills are not required for this trip. As needed, COVID-19 precautions will be in place. All team members will be required to be fully vaccinated. Registration information will be emailed in early July to those that are on the SPDR email distribution list. Registration will end in late July. If you do not receive emails from SPDR and want to be added to the list to receive registration information and other emails, or have questions about this trip, send a message to [spdr@splcmn.org].

Planning has started for the second 2021 trip. The dates are October 16-24 to Galveston, TX to help with the rebuilding from Hurricane Harvey and other storms. Watch for emails and additional information in St. Philip's publications.

Food & Clothing Shelf

As many of you know, the Food & Clothing Shelf has reopened for inside service. We have moved to rooms 16, 17, and 18 in the education wing of the church. Visitors now enter through Door 3. Room 16 is our office storage and perishable food room and Room 17A is our nonperishable food room. Beyond the flexible wall that separates Rooms 17A and 17B & C are our clothing rooms. Room18 is off-season clothing and shoe storage and where the clothing donations are received, sorted, and tagged. Members of the congregation that have visited, and especially our neighbors we serve, have been impressed with our expanded location. Visitors appreciate that they are able to choose their own items from our expanded inventory. A second refrigerator and freezer will be donated by SHIP (Safety Health Improvement Partnership) who also provided our initial refrigerator and freezer. SHIP is a joint partnership between the University of Minnesota Extension Service and Anoka County, SHIP was excited to hear that we are expanding to serve Anoka County residents in need. Once we receive the refrigerator and freezer and are fully set up, we plan to have an open house so that all can see the ministry that St. Philip's is providing to the surrounding communities. Until then, please feel free to visit us. We are open Tuesdays and Fridays from 10:00 - 11:30 am and on Wednesdays from 5:00 - 6:30pm. We give thanks for all of the members of the congregation who provide the funding for our food and clothing needs. We give thanks for everyone that has helped to move us in to our new space. We give thanks to Myron Nash for hooking us up with additional electricity. And of course, we give thanks for all the volunteers and their hours of service. We thank God for the opportunity to serve those in need. Until all are fed ... and clothed.
