The Church traditionally held a vigil on All Hallows' Eve when worshippers would prepare themselves with prayers and fasting prior to the feast day itself.

The name derives from the Old English 'hallowed' meaning holy or sanctified and is now usually contracted to the more familiar word Halloween.

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God, our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Fall is upon us and that means that Halloween is around the corner. When we think of Halloween we of course think of candy, trick-or-treating, hot apple cider, and costumes. It has become quite a secular holiday. The origins, however, are rather religious. The word Halloween comes from All Hallows' Eve. Hallows is an old word for saint. So it is the eve before All Saints' Day.

Here at St. Philip's, we have a wonderful outreach to the community with our Trunk & Treat. On Halloween evening we invite folks of the congregation to bring their cars, decorate the trunk or the bed of their pickups, and hand out candy to young ones who come. It's a nice, safe, and friendly way for families to take their kids trick-or-treating. It's also a lot of fun for the grownups too I have to say.

We are also going to try something new this year. (Yes, Lutherans do change!) We want to use Halloween as an opportunity to invite new families in the community to St. Philip's. We are going to give out large candy bars attached to an invitation card. Inside the card will be a soft fridge magnet that has our contact information and a chocolate chip cookie dough recipe. The formula is simple: the large candy bar makes sure the kids take note; the card gives the parents a nice invitation with our service times and contact information; and if they put the magnet on their fridge for the recipe, they will have our church name and contact information in a visible place. We are looking for seven households in Fridley, Spring Lake Park, and Blaine who would be willing to give out the candy bar/invitation/magnet combo on Halloween. Faithful Conversations

Our Young Adult Ministry partnership with Faith Lutheran in Coon Rapids has also been involved in work with the Riverside Innovation Hub (RIH). With grant funding, they have supported some young adult gatherings, sponsored service while accompanying community organizations, encouraged work for racial justice and knowledge in the church, and furthered work to highlight voices that are sometimes pushed to the margins. One goal of the grant is to bring some of those conversations of the marginalized voices to the church and the group decided to select some new titles for the St. Philip's and Faith Lutheran Libraries. Our Library Group will have these new titles on display for you to check out. The books vary from deeply theological (James Cone is wonderful) to secular titles. I cannot say I have read every book nor that I agree with every stance from each author. But that is part of the beauty of libraries of books and information. We are excited to have this new collection donated to the Library and look forward to continuing faithful conversations. I am excited we already have such great resources in our Library and excited for the new titles as well. Come check out new books or old books. Have conversations in the faith and utilize these wonderful resources at church.

The following are the titles and a brief description of the books donated. Thanks to the RIH group for selections and to the Library Group for all the organization and Grace for assembling the list.

Books for Children

All Are Welcome by Alexandra Penfold. Illustrations and simple rhyming text introduce a school where diversity is celebrated.

Antiracist Baby by Ibram X. Kendi. Illustrations and rhyming text present nine steps Antiracist Baby can take to improve equity.

Black Is a Rainbow Color by Angela Joy. A child reflects on the meaning of being Black in this story about a people, a culture, a history, and a legacy that lives on.

Different But the Same by Keyonna Monroe. This is the story of Paige who moved to a new town and learns about different cultures, families, and values.

God's Dream by Desmond Tutu. With warmth and humor, Archbishop Desmond Tutu distills his philosophy of unity and forgiveness into a picture book.

I Am Every Good Thing by Derrick D. Barnes. Illustrations and easy to read text pay homage to the strength, character and worth of a child.

I Can Move by Mandy Suhr. Explains how our bones and muscles help our bodies move.

Psalm Twenty-three. Illustrated by Tim Ladwig. The text of the familiar Psalm accompanies illustrations of love and fear faced by an urban African American family.

Woke: A Young Poet's Call to Justice by Mahogany L. Browne. A collection of poems by women that reflects the joy and passion in the fight for social justice.

Your Name Is a Song by Jamilah Thompkins-Bigelow. Saddened by her classmates' and teacher's mispronunciations of her name, a girl discovers names are like songs.

Young Adults

Fuzzy Mud by Louis Sachar. Two middle school kids take a shortcut home from school and discover what looks like fuzzy mud but is actually a substance with the potential to wreak havoc on the entire world.

Adult Nonfiction

Anxious to Talk About It by Carolyn B. Helsel. The author gives specific and practical guidance in how to talk about racism.

The Color of Compromise by Jemar Tisby. The truth about the American Church's complicity in racism.

The Cross and the Lynching Tree by James H. Cone. A powerful examination of race and religion in America.

Dear Church by Lenny Duncan. Duncan is a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the US: the ELCA.

Dear White Christians by Jennifer Harvey. This is the 2nd edition of a book on American racial justice issues from a Christian perspective.

The End of White Christian America by Robert P. Jones. Demographic and cultural shifts over the past few decades have led to a changing America in which the majority of people are not white Christians.

Gay Girl, Good God by Jackie Hill Perry. The author writes that this is the story of who I was and who God has always been.

Putting Jesus on Display by Brian Blount. With humor and honesty, the author shares the struggles and triumphs of a lifestyle of empowered evangelism.

Strength to Love by Martin Luther King, Jr. A classic collection of Dr. King's sermons that fuse his Christian teachings with his radical ideas of love and nonviolence to combat hate and oppression.

Patience

Lately, I have found myself growing increasingly impatient. It seems that nothing is as it once was, and this is frustrating for me. I spoke about this with my spiritual director during our last session.

I finally had to admit that this frustration has to do with my aging. My body no longer functions as it once did. I'm much slower than I used to be. I forget things. I creak when I move, and I must compensate for things I have trouble doing. I have to ask for help. And even though people are very willing to help me, I hate to ask.

A recent visit to my 97-year-old father and my stepmother brought the issues of finitude into an uncomfortable focus for me. Seeing him struggle with things was difficult.

My spiritual director asked me how this made me feel and I realized that she was asking how I feel about my own aging process as well.

COVID has dealt us a nasty blow. Nothing is as it once was, and I don't know anyone who likes this. Changes we had hoped would be gradual must now be made on a timeline we often do not appreciate. Loss is a constant companion. So, what do we do with all of this?

Prayer is a good place to begin. It is helpful to place ourselves in God's hands and to turn our gaze toward things we can do instead of toward things we cannot do. We can celebrate the life we've lived and give thanks for our many blessings.

Today I was reminded of a poem that has been a companion for many years. I would like to share it with you:

The struggle used to be to grab with both hands and shake and twist and turn and push and shove and not give in but wrest an answer from it all as Jacob did a blessing.

But there is another way to struggle with an issue, a question -

Simply to jump off into the abyss and find ourselves floating falling tumbling being led slowly and gently but surely to the answers God has for us - to watch the answers unfold before our eyes and still to be part of the unfolding.

But, Oh! The trust necessary for this new way!

Not to be always reaching out for the old hand-holds.

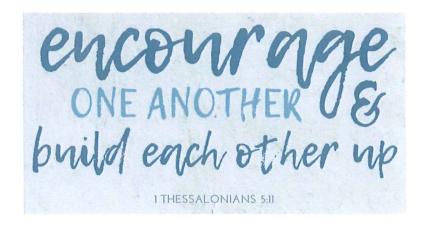

An Orderly Transition

The Garden Group has been harvesting vegetables from the variety of planting sites on the southeast side of the church. Our faithful watering during the multiple hot days of summer has shown gratifying results. We've picked sugar peas, green beans, hot and sweet peppers, cucumbers, garlic, dill, oregano, onions, rhubarb, Swiss chard, zucchini squash, tomatoes, and one surprise cantaloupe! Our final vegetable to be picked will probably be winter squash. Most of our produce has been given to St. Philip's Food Shelf and Ralph Reeder Food Shelf. Occasionally we've offered extras to workers at the garage sale and Wednesday Community Supper participants.

Spring planting is done in something of a whirlwind of activity. Fall allows a more casual experience to the end of active growing. Bean vines may not be extracted until we are certain the last edibles have been picked. Cucumber vines start hinting their end is coming with their shriveling yellow leaves. Onions coat themselves with an outer golden-brown layer and their stems fall to the side.

As we anticipate this closure, the timing provides an opportunity to say thanks along each step. We will pick the last veggie, dismantle supports and fill the compost barrel. It is an orderly transition. Last year we entered fall with lots of unknowns about how to live life around COVID. Let's hope we can make a more orderly transition this fall in protecting our community. Stay safe, St. Philip's.

Update from Tokyo Jim and Carol Sack Letter written September 1, 2021



Dear Partners in Christ: For this newsletter, we would like to share about the Paralympics taking place in Tokyo right now. They have been a total blessing to not only the competitors but to the spectators as well. Some of you may not even be aware that they are being held. From our family and friends in the States, we are told that there is hardly any coverage or no coverage at all. Since they are being held in Japan, there is daily coverage of the 539 events being held in 23 different sports. For me, there is a different feel to the Paralympics compared to the Olympics. In the Olympics there was a real sense of competition to be able to get a medal. There was fierce competition as well as clearly differentiated winners and losers. There is also real competition in the Paralympics too, but at the same time, there is also a great deal of respect for all competitors regardless of receiving a medal or not. The Paralympics provide an opportunity for athletes with disabilities to compete on an international level. The six main disability categories are: amputee, cerebral palsy, intellectual disability, visually impaired, spinal injuries, and "Les Autres," for conditions that do not fall into the other categories.

We have found the Paralympic competitions to be very inspirational and rewarding to watch. More than with the Olympics, the competitors seem to have a genuine interest in their opponents. There is mutual support among the athletes and awe at what each athlete is able to do with their individual disabilities. It makes us see the beauty in each person that God intrinsically gave each of us. When God made creation we read, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness." No matter what disability an athlete has, that image of God can be seen in their striving to do their very best in whatever sport they happen to be competing in. The attitudes of courage, hope, trust, and love are profoundly visible with each contest. At the end of a competition you can see the mutual respect the athletes have for one another, knowing how much effort and energy was needed to just be in the Paralympics. From Psalm 139, verses 13 and 14 we read, "For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made." Through the Paralympics we see these verses become reality. Some athletes were born with a disability, while others were disabled through sickness or accident. However, each competitor "does their best" and that is awesome and inspiring. Disabilities are not barriers, but challenges to be overcome. They give glory to God by striving. "Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead." Philippians 3:13 Often as we have watched the events, we visually see Philippians 2:3 in action. "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves." Therefore, watching the Paralympics is like seeing a video of the Bible.

Update from Tokyo

In some ways the Paralympics is a concrete example of how God would have us live in this world. Accepting ourselves just as we are, and furthermore accepting others just as they are. The following verses come to mind, as we watch these athletes: 1 Peter 3:8 "Finally, all of you, be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble." Romans 15:1, 5, 7 "We who are strong ought to bear with the failings of the weak and not to please ourselves.... May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Christ Jesus had... Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God." Even our 7 and 9-year old granddaughters who are participating in swimming lessons were awed by the competition. They called us and said, "Even though they don't have arms or legs they can swim really fast! You have to watch!" We would like to ask for prayers for each and every competitor at this year's Paralympics. May they be encouraged, whether they "win" or "lose." We also ask for prayers for each one of us that we too are able to accept ourselves, just as God has created us.
