- Have you noticed the new, comfy furniture near door 2?

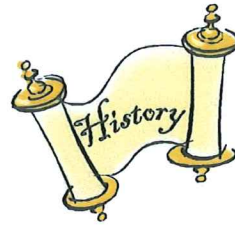
Summer Worship

A Tale of Two Cornerstones

On Sunday, June 8, 1958, the first of two cornerstones for St. Philip's Lutheran Church were laid. The ceremony started during Sunday services that morning at Nelson School in Columbia Heights and continued at the construction site for the new church in Fridley. Officiating at the service was Dr. Philip Dybvig, Executive Director of the Department of Home Missions of The Evangelical Lutheran Church and Reverend Mandus Egge, pastor for the new church. Items placed in the cornerstone include a Bible, hymnal, textbooks used in the congregation's teaching program, a constitution, bulletins, newspaper clippings, pictures, and other items that are of importance to the church. The names of all who are members of the congregation at the time were also included.

The second cornerstone was laid on Sunday, May 29, 1966. Founded in 1958, this was the third and largest building program and was designed to incorporate the existing building. The copper box behind the cornerstone contains a Bible, constitution, membership directory, history of the congregation, bond brochure, annual report, photographs, service bulletin, church newsletter, and two issues of the Fridley Record containing information on the May 6 tornado. Pastor Norm Eitrheim led the ceremonies while Dean Regal, brick foreman for H.O. Mikkelsen Contractors laid the stone. Both cornerstones are located near Door #2 on the east side of the building.

Spring Trip Recap St. Philip's Disaster Relief



Waverly, TN is a community of 4,000 residents located about 80 miles straight west of Nashville. On August 21, 2021, twenty inches of rain fell in the area in five hours. Shortly after the rain fall ended, a 200-foot railroad embankment failed, sending a 20-foot wall of water into the town of Waverly. 140 of the 400 homes in Waverly were damaged or destroyed. Of the 4,000 residents, 20 lost their lives including a set of seven-month-old twins.

From May 6 -14, a SPDR team of 14 traveled to Waverly to assist in the rebuilding of homes and lives. The group worked in two homes during the week. The first home belonged to Dan and Gretchen, built in 1912 sustained major first floor damage as a result of two to three feet of water flooding the home. The team insulated the outer walls and installed the lower four feet of sheet rock wall throughout the home. The second home was owned by Bryan and Nellie, who had just moved to Waverly from Long Island, New York, eight months before the flood. Sheet rocking had been completed in this home prior to the team's arrival so the next step was flooring. During the five days, the group laid over 1,500 sq. ft. of wooding flooring, completing the task. All the windows in the home and a few doors were trimmed out. The team worked an accumulative of about 530 hours in Waverly. The ministry surpassed 35,000 total hours worked over the past 16 years. They stayed at the Waverly United Methodist church in downtown Waverly.

The long-term recovery in Waverly has just begun and will continue for years to come. The emotional stress and memories caused by the flood will last forever. Waverly is a small community of many strong-willed individuals who will rebuild their town. They will need God's help and the help of many others. The SPDR ministry is strongly considering at this time returning to Waverly in early October. Thank you for your continued financial and prayerful support.

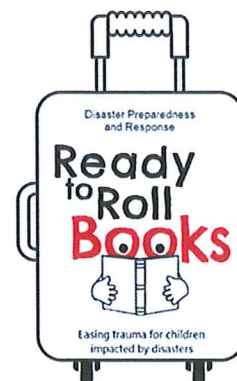
Ready to Roll Books

Thank you to all those that have donated books and carry-ons to the SPDR "Ready to Roll Books" project so far. The carry-ons will be outfitted with a shelf unit, filled with the books, and then staged in a disaster-prone area ready to be deployed for children that have lost their books in a disaster. This project is still rolling and will continue to collect carry-on luggage and children's books in June. Needed are:

- New or gently used books. Due to the size of the carry-ons, 9"x 9" or smaller books are preferred.
- Wheeled carry-on luggage that is in good condition with working wheels, main zipper, handle, etc.

Books can be left in the bins that are located in the Narthex and Door 2 and carry-ons can be left next to the bins. Any books or carry-ons that can't be used for this project will be donated to St. Philip's Garage Sale.

During the SPDR trip to Waverly, TN in May, the team members met Pr. Morgan Gordy, Assistant to the Bishop for Disaster Ministry for the ELCA Southeastern Synod. Pr. Gordy was very interested in the "Ready to Roll Books". Later this summer the carry-ons filled with books will be rolling to Texas and Tennessee to help kids impacted by disasters.

Mr. Hatuka is an Educationist and a retired Civil Servant. He was a one-time Administrator of Bidoma State Development Area. He resides in Bille and is a serving Elder of the LCCN Bille Council. He was one of the signatories of LCCN Bille Outreach Project Account.

News from LCCN Bille and Environs

The Congregation of LCCN Bille is growing both spiritually and in number. We had a successful Easter Celebration. The sub-groups in the church are all participating actively in the church activities.

We had local government council elections in Adamawa State on April 9, 2022, and it was conducted successfully across Adamawa State and in Bille, too. The rainfall is back again and farming activities will commence in earnest. We pray for a bountiful harvest at the end of the rainy season.

The evangelist is doing well at his station, though he had an accident recently and has recovered and resumed to work. Mr. Hatuka will brief you in details about the evangelist accident when he communicates to you.

Visiting the United States

Dear Sponsoring Congregations:

It has been four years since we have been able to go back to the States and do visitation to our sponsoring congregations due to the Covid-19 situation. However, we are planning to be back this summer and hope we will be able to visit as many congregations as we can. Some issues regarding having to teach here, transportation, programming, and the unknown situation of quarantine upon returning to Japan, has made our time in the States limited to about seven weeks. We have a total of six Sundays open, with the August 21 date already taken. Below is the information and dates we would have open to make a visit to your church. We are required to attend what is known as the "Becoming Conference" near ELCA headquarters in Chicago from August 21-28. We have one congregation very near Chicago and therefore will stay at that church on August 21.

- July 31
- August 7
- August 14
- August 28 "Becoming Conference"
- September 4 (A church within 100 miles of the Twin Cities would be helpful.)

If you have a desire to have the Sacks visit you this summer please email us back. Of course, we can also be available to meet with churches during the weekdays as well. In the past, we have had many very meaningful gatherings at sponsoring churches that were not held on Sunday. In fact, smaller number of people attending tends to create an atmosphere where deeper sharing is possible. We hope we can find a mutually satisfying date where we can be with your church community. We also realize that summer is filled with many people taking vacations. Just a reminder about costs to the congregation when we visit. While in the States we are responsible personally for transportation and travel costs. We estimate that it will cost between \$200-225 per congregation. Thank you for your cooperation in that respect. In past years, some congregations have taken a free will offering at the time of our visit and this has usually more than covered the cost of the visit. In that way it greatly reduces the cost to the church itself. Global Mission indicates that the congregations are asked to provide hospitality (meals and lodging) at the time of our visit. We are always open to either staying with a host family or at a motel, whichever is better for the congregation. So please let us know if it is possible to be with you. If you would respond to this email with two possible dates that would assist us to visit as many congregations as possible. We will be staying at the home of a friend in St. Paul, when we are not on the road. Thank you for your consideration of having the Sacks visit you this summer.

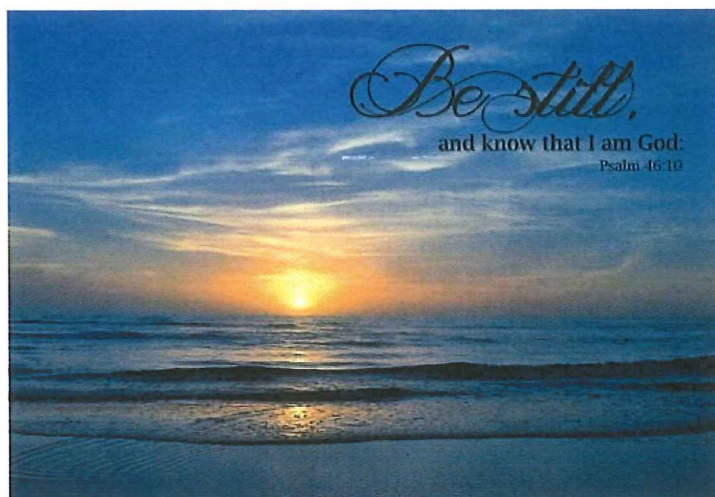
