Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Our mission statement consists of three parts: Worship, Grow, & Serve. We worship God together in music, Word, and Sacrament. We grow in our discipleship by walking together in God's Holy Word. We serve God, by serving others locally, regionally, and globally. For a congregation our size, we do a whole lot. We also are making a tangible difference in the lives of our people and in the lives of members of the community. The people of St. Philip's are the church; our building is our most visible and useful tool for our ministry and faith life together.

Like any house, God's house on occasion needs to be fixed and renovated. We have several building needs to attend to, so we are launching a modest capital campaign to raise the funds we need. We're calling the campaign Building For the Future II, because the first Building For the Future was so successful; St. Philip's is a generous congregation. Our goal is to raise \$425,000 over three years. We are seeking to complete several projects and of course we will tithe off this campaign.

In our Tuesdays Together Bible Study we are currently working through the Acts of the Apostles. Toward the end of Acts 2 there is an image of Christian community that can shock our current understanding of how we live together.

"All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." ~ Acts 2:44-47 NRSV

Keeping all things in common is a pretty radical thought for most of us. These texts can and should challenge us to consider the way in which we live in community with others. We Enter the Church Heritage Group



August 1958 was a very important time in the life of the new church. The congregation had been meeting at the Nelson School in Columbia Heights for worship services since February and Sunday, August 10, was to be the first worship service in the new building – currently the Chapel.

The August 1958 edition of *The Evangel* – early name for the church newsletter - describes the day:

... Sunday, August 10, 1958, will be remembered as a red-letter day in the history of St. Philip's Lutheran Church, for on this date the first services will be held in the Church. It's a time the members of the congregation, as well as a lot of the people in the Fridley community have been looking forward to.


The article goes on to describe the new facility:


... Not every detail in the church will be completed, but enough will be ready so the church can be used for the services. There will be some carpentry work left, of the "do-it-yourself" work, for instance, our men won't have the altar rail ready, but that won't be needed until the next Communion service. The altar, pulpit, and baptismal font will be done, and all will be used at the first service.

The article continues:

... The doors to the church will be locked and all who attend will wait outside until the time for the service. Then the Pastor will knock at the door of the church and the chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee will open the door and admit the congregation.







Update From Tokyo

Dear Supporting Congregations: We know this Newsletter is late by about 10 days, but there is a good reason for that. In Japan yesterday, we had a national election and a graduate of Japan Luther College (JLC) was a candidate for a position. The results were just announced and therefore we can now send this on to you.

Daisuke Tenbata (age 40), was elected as a member of the Upper House in the Japanese government with the Reiwa Shinsei opposition party. As a researcher at Ritsumeikan University who is severely disabled, Daisuke has been conducting research on assisted employment. He was disabled at the age of 14 due to a medical mistake. He ran for office, saying, "I want to make the caregiver system easier to use."



Born in 1981 in Hiroshima Prefecture, Daisuke suffered cardiac arrest in 1996, which left him with multiple disabilities including limb paralysis, speech impediment, and visual impairment. In addition to being bedridden and unable to move his body, he was unable to speak and could not communicate with anyone for six months. In addition, he has a visual impairment that prevents him from reading flat objects and a limb impairment that prevents him from controlling his body.

While recovering from the mistake at the hospital, his mother noticed his desperate pleas for help and she came up with the idea of reading out the words "a, ka, sa, ta na...etc" and confirming his intentions one letter at a time. This is a little hard to explain in English but there are about 50 syllables in the Japanese language. Daisuke can twitch his shoulder and another person can then go through the 50 syllable alphabet to identify the first syllable of a word. Once that is confirmed, the same is done with the next syllable until a word is formed. As you might expect, this can be time consuming, but once a translator becomes accustomed to the process, it can be done quite efficiently.

While searching for a university that he could apply to, he studied using this method, and over the next four years, he was able to enter the college where we are, the Japan Lutheran College. That was in 2003. He took the entrance examination here with special considerations but failed. The college allowed him to audit classes for one year, and he studied very hard to pass the exam the next year. I had the privilege of proctoring his English exams those two years.

Our college tries to accept as many disabled students as possible. Whether we can accept a student or not depends on the type of disability they have. Daisuke led a fulfilling student life with the support of many people, including notetakers and others who helped him move from classroom to classroom. He was a very popular student. Daisuke helped to create the Lutheran Support Service (LSS) which is an organization for supporting the university life of students with disabilities. Currently many students with disabilities are receiving aid in this way.

After graduating from JLC, Daisuke completed the doctoral program in the Department of Advanced Comprehensive Studies at Ritsumeikan University. Just three weeks ago on June 17, 2022, it was announced that he would run as a candidate in the election for the House of Councilors which was held this week on July 10. He was successfully elected in the election yesterday!

In regard to his life he shares, "It is a great challenge for me just to put into words the things I want to say. In my case, when I want to revise my speech in the middle of a talk, the only way to preserve my thoughts in the form of words is to have my caregiver listen to me again from the beginning. My way of speaking, in which I cannot say much and use only a few words, makes it difficult for the caregiver and me to see the subtle feelings, meanings, and other evolving thoughts, which can easily lead to confusion and misunderstanding."

But he states with great vigor: "I want to talk!" These problems have led him to his current research on the subject of "communication with people with disabilities. "I want to communicate, but I can't. I don't want to be dependent, I want to be trusted. My goal is to start with my own personal problems, and then to conduct research for the benefit of people with speech difficulties as a whole. I want to speak by myself without the help of others! I am struggling in the vortex of my never-ending desire to speak in my own language without the help of others."

We ask for your prayers on behalf of Mr. Daisuke Tenbata, that he may be an effective politician who can bring benefits to the people in Japan, especially those who are disabled. He has been a wonderful inspiration to so many people with whom he relates, and continues to be a servant even with the difficulties he has in living and speaking.

As you are most likely aware, former Prime Minister Shinzo Abe was assassinated in an extremely rare event of gun violence. This has shocked the nation. Please pray that this event not become a precedent for increased violence in Japan.
