



## Speak and Listen in Prayer Eric Nelson, Associate Pastor

"In the morning, while it was still very dark, Jesus got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed." - Mark 1:35

In this season of Lent, our Wednesday evening preaching series is on different types of prayer. (Services are Wednesdays at 6:00 pm in-person and online on our website.) Reminders and refreshers in prayer are so beneficial for our daily lives in each season. Schedules can get chaotic or days can become mundane. We can feel like all things are going our way or like we're trying to forge upstream without a paddle. No matter what the day brings, prayer is essential.

Mark's gospel is notorious for quickly and briefly highlighting stories of Jesus' life and ministry. By Mark 1:35, Jesus has been baptized and called the Son of God, tempted in the wilderness, preaching and calling disciples to follow, casting out demons, and curing the sick. In the morning after Jesus had cast out demons and healed many with diseases late into the evening, we hear these words in Mark 1:35.

"In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed."

Jesus sought solitude to be in communication in prayer. I don't expect any of us to be Jesus, but we should certainly follow him. As he sought silence for prayer, we ought to as well. His ministry among the crowds is unlike anything else. He brings healing and life, but he too modeled this need as a human to be in solitude to communicate with God. If we are also to bring a portion of Christ's love and healing, we also need to be rooted in God's will in prayer. And we need solitude for this. To best listen to and communicate with one another, we remove the distractions around us.

I come from a pretty small and relatively quiet family. I don't think I'll ever forget the first time I met my wife's extended family. They were wonderful, joking and hazing the new guy a bit, sure, but wonderfully welcoming and sharing in joy together as a family. There were probably four times as many people as in my own typical family gatherings and it felt at least ten times as loud. It was a good gathering with wonderful people, but it was not a space and time for quiet conversation. I had to try desperately to focus on the conversation at hand in the midst of all the noise. Can you imagine the commotion around Jesus as he cured the sick and cast out demons? It was nothing but wonderful, but also was not a place and time for quiet conversation with God.

Whether you are an extrovert or an introvert, we are called to both gather in a Christian community and hold times of solitude to focus ourselves in prayer with God. We quiet all else to listen only for God's voice and will. In any relationship, we reserve time to speak and listen. This is a key part of our life in faith. Jesus' model for prayer is beneficial for each of our lives in faith as well.

I pray God's will and presence will be known to you as you speak and listen in prayer this Lenten season. May the God who sends us to service in a chaotic world speak lovingly to our hearts in silence to guide us and remind us of our place and purpose as God's beloved children.

## Forgiveness Margie Guelker, Visitation Pastor

Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy; blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin.

Create a clean heart in me, O God and put a new and right spirit within me.

Cast me not away from your presence and take not your holy spirit from me.

Psalm 51:1,2 & 10,11

We are entering deeply into Lent. It is time to put our spiritual house in order -- to scrub our souls clean. But this is not something we can do on our own. It is a process that involves God and others. First, we need to acknowledge the sin that we carry and make ready to be done with it.

I grew up Catholic and often went to the Sacrament of Penance, or Confession. To prepare for this I would examine my conscience making note of egregious or recurring sins. When I was ready I would enter the confessional and wait for the priest to slide the little door open. Then I would confess my sins and make an "act of contrition" and receive absolution. Sometimes there would be some advice and always there would be prayers to be said.

I have to tell you that it felt good. Did it last? Not always. But I knew that forgiveness was always waiting for me. And that felt good too.

We not only need to be forgiven, but we all have people we need to forgive. Lent is a good time to work on that project in our lives. A professor at Fuller Seminary wrote this about forgiveness: "Forgiveness is surrendering your right to hurt back." Let that sink in.

Pray for those you need to forgive because it's not all about what you may need to do. It's also about what needs to be done for you. Forgiveness is a gift of God for you. It's all about creating a new heart.

Have a blessed Lent and let Jesus change you.

## Stories From the Food & Clothing Shelf

We offer free blood pressure screenings on Tuesdays and Fridays (Ann Westby on Tuesdays and Kathy Knutson on Fridays). We use a model provided to us by the American Heart Association. Approximately 1/3 of the Tuesday and Friday visitors take part in this service. On the last day of the month, a woman came in and enthusiastically announced that our blood pressure screening had saved her life. In one of our recent blood pressure screenings, her blood pressure was found to be severely elevated and we recommended that she visit her doctor immediately. She did so and her doctor admitted her to the hospital where she spent three days getting her blood pressure under control. She looked so much better and obviously was so thankful that we offer the service and caught her high blood pressure and possibly saved her life.

Wednesday evenings we are seeing a huge increase in Spanish-speaking visitors. At the Annual Meeting, I mentioned that Connor and Aiden Bertsch attend Spring Lake Park's Spanish Immersion School and offered to interpret for those visitors who don't speak English. They have been an amazing asset to the Food & Clothing Shelf Ministry. A blessing to St. Philip's. Thank you, Aiden & Connor.

#### **Examples of Various Visitor Dialogues:**

1) A man from St. Louis Park with 3 kids and 2 adults in the family. 1st time visitor.

Hall Monitor: How did you find us - a food shelf in Fridley?

A man from St. Louis Park: I checked online for food shelves open tonight.

Hall Monitor: Would you like to look for clothes also?

Man from St. Louis Park: I'll take a look at what you have but I don't need anything at this time. You have a wonderful selection of food and clothing. Thank you so much.

2) Woman immigrant from Ukraine with 2 kids and 2 adults. Speaking in broken but understandable English.

Hall Monitor: (on entry) You may have two bags of food and one bag of clothing.

Guest: (on exit) Thank you so much.

## Trip and Updates St. Philip's Disaster Relief Ministry



A SPDR Team will be traveling to Waverly, TN for the third time in a year. The trip will take place in the last week of April, leaving Saturday, April 22, working for five days in Waverly, and returning on Sunday, April 30. In August of 2021, the area received 20 inches of rain in a 24-hour period causing severe flooding throughout the community. The SPDR team will assist in the rebuilding efforts in Waverly and the surrounding area. The team will stay at the Waverly United Methodist Church.

Registration for the trip will run from Saturday, April 1 - Saturday, April 8. Registration will take place via email. If you don't currently receive email from SPDR and wish to receive the registration information, please send a request to [spdr@splcmn.org] for the registration info. Please also consider this an invitation to join the team. All are welcome and no building skills are required.

Team members and others continue to prepare and move our equipment and supplies into the SPDR stall of the new Storage Facility. For many years now, everything has been stored in several locations. We have built shelving and have begun to move everything into the facility. Our larger trailer was moved to its new home a few weeks ago. The second trailer will make the move this spring. Thank you for everyone's help in making this long - overdue project a reality.

## **Community Supper Donations**

Due to certain modifications within our Community Supper, the funds necessary to continue this ministry have increased. Loaves and Fishes no longer provide us with free food. This means the support for this ministry will need to come by donations from the congregation. Donations may be made in way of monetary giving or of specific food items. Money may be given through PushPay or by mailing/sending payment to the office.

- Sponsor a meal for \$200 (the price per supper)
- Sponsor the protein for a meal for \$100
- Donate any amount to the Community Supper
- Take a tag from the board in the Narthex, purchase the food item and return it to the bin in the Narthex.

Food items should be placed in the bin in the Narthex or brought to the office. Much needed food items include:

- ~ Cans of fruit
- ~ Cans of vegetables

- ~ Boxes of mashed potatoes ~ Lg. cans of tuna
- ~ Jars of spaghetti sauce
- ~ Jars of alfredo sauce

- ~ Boxes of scalloped potatoes ~ Disposable roasting pans
- ~ Family sized cans of cream of mushroom and cream of chicken soup

## Organ Notes Heritage Group



The new church needed everything! Number one on that need list was an organ. The February 26, 1958, edition of the Evangel included a column entitled "Things Needed".

There are three things that the Pastor has been looking for, and which he has not yet found. If anyone can be of help, speak with him about it.

One is a reed organ. This is for use at the parsonage, in the basement, until the church is ready. We have borrowed a field organ from the Gateway Gospel Mission but that has to be returned before long. Does anyone know where we might secure a good reed organ?

By the summer of 1958, a large Etsy two-manual and pedal reed organ built in 1907 was brought from Albert Lea.

Orien Vick, chairperson of the Worship, Music, and Arts Committee brought the organ to the church and Stanley Snow and several others repaired the organ and added an electric motor. The organ did not have quite enough power, however, so an usher could often be seen rushing to the back to pump the organ to get the congregation through a hymn. The organ was placed in the rear of the chapel and was used for all worship services until the main sanctuary was completed in 1966.

In January of 1965, the church purchased a two manual and pedal clavier pipe organ from the Hillgreen, Lane & Company in Alliance Ohio. The purchase price was \$16,400. Installation was completed in December 1965 and on December 11, 1966, the organ was dedicated with a Festival of Music with Dr. Paul Manz as guest organist.

By 1978 a committee had been formed to make recommendations on the purchase of a new pipe organ for the Sanctuary. The "First 25 Fund" was established to raise funds to purchase the new organ before the 25th Anniversary in May 1983. The Schantz Organ Company of Orrville, Ohio was selected, and an order was placed in June of 1981.

42 ranks, 46 stops, and 2,337 pipes! A beautiful instrument to be built specifically for St. Philip's. The purchase price was \$179,886. The delivery and installation were completed in October 1982. A dedication concert was held on December 5, with guest organist Howard Don Small. After over 40 years of service, the current Building for the Future II fund raiser will dedicate funds to maintain this beautiful instrument.
