If you're going to an area without any suitable churches, you and your household can take a few minutes to do devotions on Sunday morning (or any or every day you choose). There are many devotional books and apps available, but a scripture reading and prayer do well also. If you are hosting guests coming into town, make it a point to bring them to worship at St. Philip's. When you bring guests, please come a little early so you can show them where to find all the important things like restrooms and coffee. Please welcome them to communion and explain how we do it here. If they have kids, let them know about the children's sermon, activity bags, and the pray ground. I hope your summer is a wonderful time of rest, renewal, and adventure whether you are traveling or hosting. God is always with you no matter where you go, so make it a spiritual habit to connect to God each day in your personal devotions and to praise God each week in worship no matter where you are.

#### All are Welcome Here!

I normally don't write anything that has to do with theology because we have our amazing Pastors, Matt, Eric, and Margie that do such a wonderful job, but I felt called to share what I was able to experience. This year was my first year attending the Synod Assembly. While the handling of the church business is part of the process on Saturday, first we attended service the night before. Being able to visit other churches, seeing what they are doing, seeing how inviting their churches are, and seeing how other elements can be brought into service, was a wonderful way to spend a Friday night and Saturday. It has given me simple ideas that we could try ourselves here at St Philip's. During the business meeting on Saturday, we were also given the privilege of listening to Senior Pr. Dr. Rev. Otis Moss III from Trinity United Church of Christ in Chicago. He spoke on community engagement & advancement, and social justice as foundations of ministry. He spoke the words from the Bible while also translating those messages to reflect today's world. My thoughts from his speech:

Dr. Rev. Moss III spoke of the graveyard ministry – the gathering of the body of believers – the church community. He stated, "The problem that we face in the 21st Century is that the church was never constructed, nor designed, not theologically nor spiritually, to have the capacity to be in alignment with empire. Church, to be, in alignment with empire, must go through a vast number of hoops to twist itself and the message of the gospel in order to align itself with that which it was never to be aligned with. The church was never designed to be in alignment with the status quo." "We were never designed to be part of the status quo, but an alternative community." We should help "breathe new life into those lives that have been marginalized by larger systems and larger ideas and things that shrink the human spirit." "We have confused, or we have removed, and our religion has gotten in the way of our faith. Religion is the system, the framing, the package by which some enter into a structure, an understanding of what eventually may be faith. Part of the problem is that we have become so focused on the system that we end up marginalizing the Savior." "Jesus always upset our systems, always challenging our religion, always daring us to go deeper." "We are called to and hope to be better tomorrow than what we were yesterday. We are not to be the empire. What modernity has done to us is made bureaucrats out of poets to hold the status quo instead of speaking beauty into one spirit. This text is challenging to the church as we read it in a spiritual manner so that we do not see the depth and the radicality of what is in that word. It challenges us collectively as a community of believers." "Jesus and his crew," traveled to "the graveyard, in the space where things were dead" and "had no economic development, no good school system, where there is a high mortality rate, where no one wants to come and no one wants to invest, Jesus becomes a light within this particular space." "Instead of locking those up that have chains locked around their wrists and chains around their ankles," we should be "providing public help instead of incarnating them" or "writing them off." "Let's not be the chain-making business that makes money off the chains of those that are to be incarcerated." "Jesus was living his life in this space to help lift those up." "Church needs a graveyard ministry and faithful living."

Such a powerful message that had a profound and lasting effect on me. This is one that we all can and do live by in the great work that we are doing at St. Philip's. Things like our Disaster Relief teams, Food & Clothing Shelf, Quilters, Youth Mission Trip, Community Supper, and the Benevolence Committee. The list goes on and it warms my heart. Let's be a graveyard ministry and continue to reach out to the community and those that are marginalized, lift those up, not hurt one another, and make it known that...All are Welcome Here!

## Benevolence Committee Updates

We have made updates to how we do things for our Thanksgiving and Christmas giving and want to share with you.

For Thanksgiving, instead of shopping and purchasing canned goods, we are going to give Walmart gift cards. These will vary with the size of the family, and we will be asking for \$10 and \$15 gift cards in November. Food & Clothing Shelf clients will register for these cards and pick them up prior to Thanksgiving, giving them the opportunity to purchase what they would like.

We will also work with Food & Clothing Shelf clients for our Christmas giving. Families will register and we are planning a shopping event for parents. We will collect items and hopefully they will be able to choose two gifts for each child. A limit will be placed on the number of children for whom we can provide gifts. The shopping will likely take place the second Saturday in December, but we will be holding, "Christmas in July".

Backpack collection will be at the end of July/beginning of August. Fewer items will be collected along with backpacks.



# Creating a Chapel Heritage Group



Today's Chapel is where St. Philip's began. It occupies part of the original Sanctuary which was used for services from 1958 to 1966. The 1991 building project included plans to complete the interior space as a fulfillment of an earlier vision by founding pastor Mandus Egge. During the 1991 construction, the front portion of the original Sanctuary was made into storerooms (choir, quilters, paraments and banners) while the rear portion became a part of the current hallway and restrooms. The remaining portion was designated to be a Chapel.

The Art & Interior Design Committee, a subcommittee of Worship, Music & Arts was tasked with the project. Committee members included Bob Becker (chair), Lorraine Ordemann, Ralph Petersen, and Marilyn Hole. The Mandus Egge Memorial Fund, established after Egge's death in July 1993, provided much of the funding.

The Chapel Dove was designed and constructed on site by Ralph Petersen. Work on the dove and raised platform began in mid-August 1994 and was completed by mid-September. The budget was \$750. The communion rail and final clean up lasted into November. The altar was built in Ralph's home workshop the following year. Ralph credits his faith, Casio's scientific calculator, and the many volunteers who worked weekends, evenings, and holidays to insure the successful completion of this beautiful space. An estimated 300 hours of construction time was given by Ralph and volunteers. The original cross was mounted on the back wall of the new space. Originally stained black, the cross was refinished to allow the natural mahogany color to show through.

Also on the back wall is a wall hanging designed by Bev Schillinger and woven by Shirley Herrick. Originally created for the Unity Hospital Chapel, it was later donated to St. Philip's.

New track lighting was installed that would highlight different elements in the room.

In 1995 Elaine Knoff, Lorraine Ordemann and Clem Coverston took a stained-glass class at a local community college. Armed with their newfound knowledge, they created panels that resembled the stained-glass windows in the sanctuary and were designed to cover the valance lighting.

The Chapel baptismal font was made for the original Sanctuary.

More recent Chapel history is found in the May 2023 edition of the Friend, under BOA Highlights.

The baby grand piano previously used in the Chapel was donated to Keys 4/4 Kids and a used Yamaha Clavinova was purchased in its place.

The Chapel is intended to be used as a more intimate setting for rites of the church - weddings, funerals, and baptisms. It is designed as a venue for small ensemble and solo concerts as well. Any appropriate use of the Chapel is encouraged.

# SPDR Spring Trip Written by Renee Johnson



Another successful SPDR rebuilding trip was completed at the end of last month. 22 individuals traveled from five states to Waverly, TN to continue helping those that were impacted by flash flooding in August 2021.

What we thought was going to be a week of mostly smaller jobs to finish up the last remaining work in several homes didn't turn out quite like that. We ended up working just a day or two in two homes, 3-4 days in two other homes, and all five days at another home – with almost the whole team there on the last day.

The work was varied and matched our skills well. Some team members were on the second floor of a home building and erecting exterior walls while others were down in a crawl space shoring up the beams of a sagging living room floor in another home. A couple of team members were climbing up and down ladders to install crown molding in rooms with 12' ceilings while several others were on their knees a few blocks away installing laminate flooring throughout the house. In addition to the flooring, others worked outside installing vinyl siding on the front and back gables (the easier, lower part had already been done the week before by volunteers from St. Louis.) Several others on the team spent a good share of the week with a paintbrush in their hand – painting all the ceilings and walls in the home where the flooring and siding were installed as well as the window trim (that was later installed by some of our team) and even part of a picket fence at another house. Drywall was replaced, taped, and mudded by a couple of team members in two different homes along with a few other tasks. Both the front door and the screen door, at the home with the sagging floor, were removed and re-installed by two team members and now both doors close. And, of course, our kitchen crew worked all week planning and preparing our meals at Waverly United Methodist Church where we stayed.

On some trips, we never get a chance to meet the homeowners, but this trip we did. One stopped by a few times to check on the progress of his home, one fixed her crew a wonderful lunch and her husband and his brother helped out with the wall building some of the days, a third one let us use her backyard for our Friday evening pizza party – even though she wasn't home, and the fourth, who was working from home in her living room while our team members were cutting into her floor and pounding beneath it to shore it up. After our first day of work in her home, she wrote this on the SPDR Facebook page: "Today I was blessed with such a wonderful group of individuals working on my home. The atmosphere created with their presence just makes the heart happy. An extremely knowledgeable, and compassionate TEAM. Words can only surface the gratitude I have for what they are doing for me. I pray an abundance of blessings over all the volunteers for their selfless acts. Praying for their health and safety, not only as they help individuals as myself to restore their homes/lives but always."

And after our second day, she wrote "Another wonderful day with SPDR. Everywhere I turned, there was someone selflessly giving their time and efforts for me. When they came to my house, they didn't know who was on the other side of that door. What type of person I was, or if I deserved their help. None of that mattered. They pulled in my driveway ready and selflessly with a pure heart. It was more than a physical restoration, but also a spiritual restoration as well. Building floor supports and relationships at the same time. This is the definition of good people. We laughed, we cried, it was a beautiful experience. Something I will never forget."

The journey continues... for SPDR and the people of Waverly.



Judy and Karen took part in a 100-mile garage sale event and during their many stops purchased clothing that filled up room 18. Now they and Sandy have their work cut out to tag and put into stock all the clothing for guests to enjoy.

A first-time woman visitor was referred to us by Anoka County Social Service on the 89th block to the west of Central. It was her first time visiting a food shelf. Her first comment was that she loved our orange T-shirt uniforms. We went over the visitation procedure and told her about our Wednesday evening meals. She was amazed and will be sure to take part in those meals. When she got into the food and clothing rooms she was overjoyed. She was so appreciative of our inventory offering. When she was ready to leave we told her we were doing blood pressure checks. She said her blood pressure might be high because she was so overjoyed. She did have her blood pressure checked.

In April 4,485 pounds of food was distributed and 425 pounds of clothing was distributed during the 12 days we were open. Until all are fed. . . and clothed

### Letter from Jim and Carol Sack

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

It has very much turned to spring here in Japan, and this is one of my favorite seasons. Simultaneously many varieties of flowers and flowering trees bloom and create a visual symphony of colors and beauty. Probably the most famous one is the "Sakura," or the cheery trees. Once again, this year we were treated to the beauty of the Sakura that God has created and used to inspire so many. We have just celebrated the Resurrection of our Lord and the Sakura always reminds me of that fact, as they usually bloom very close to Easter. They bring a concrete sense of new life and everything in the world feels right.

Shortly after the cherry blossoms fall from the trees, the intense colors of vibrant green



come out as trees give birth to new leaves. We are just now at the end of new leaves coming out in full force. Recently I have been studying about something called "Shinrin Yoku" in Japanese, which is translated "Forest Bathing" in English. In the States, most of you are able to readily access nature no matter where you live. However, in Japan, especially Tokyo, wide patches of nature may not be easily found in this "concrete jungle." 78% of Japanese currently live in the city.

With Forest Bathing, it is thought that being in nature can restore our mood, give us better energy and vitality, as well



as refresh and rejuvenate us. We take in the forest through our senses. In both Shinto and Buddhism, it is believed that the forest is the realm of the divine. This is in line with our belief that God created all of nature for the pleasure of humans. After creating each day, we read that "God saw that it was good." When we draw upon the power of nature, there is now a wealth of data indicating that forest bathing provides reduced blood pressure, lower stress, improved cardiovascular heath, improved concentration and memory, improved pain thresholds and even a boost to the immune system.

#### Letter from Jim and Carol Sack



Research has even found that there was a significant increase in sleep time after experiencing a forest-bathing day, suggesting that you sleep better when you spend time in a forest, even when you don't significantly increase the amount of physical activity you do. Phytoncides are the natural oils within a plant and are part of a tree's defense system. Trees release phytoncides to protect themselves from bacteria, insects, and fungi. Phytoncides are also part of the communication pathway between trees: the way trees talk to each other. Researchers have shown that phytoncides can: stimulate a pleasant mood, significantly lower blood pressure and heart rate and bring your nervous system into balance and make you feel comfortable and relaxed. Maybe this has become too detailed, but as a summary, walking

slowly through a forest will help you to keep your senses open, to notice things and to smell the fresh air. Immersed in nature, we are in a whole new dimension, a restorative sonic landscape. Being still and quiet, we are able to hear the sound of silence and begin to relax. I am convinced that in the creation of the heavens and the earth, our Lord God was making a place of peace, rest, and serenity, where male and female could relax and enjoy all that God had made. At the end of Genesis 1, we read that God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth and to every bird of the air and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life... God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good."

I hope that we all can take even a short time to enjoy God's wonderful creation that surrounds us, each day.

We ask for your prayers:

- 1) that Carol and I can make use of our teaching to relay the message that God is wanting to bless each one of us, so we also can be a blessing to others.
- 2) that the nine students in the seminary may continue to strongly feel the call to ministry.
- 3) that the four seniors in the seminary will receive assignments that they can do meaningful ministry for God.
- 4) that the newly elected pastors and lay people for our national church will be inspired to lead in this time of various difficulties.
- 5) that there truly may be peace in a world filled with conflict.
- 6) That the Lord's Spirit would call new persons into the prayer ministry of Pastoral Harp.

We thank you for your ongoing support of our ministry here.
