Scrappy Church Matt Flom, Pastor

19 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God, our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In October, Pr. Eric and I will be preaching a series called Scrappy Church. The series is about congregational renewal and revitalization. The name comes from the idea that when a team is down, they need to not lose heart, but have a scrappy attitude. Throughout the 20 teens, St. Philip's declined for a dozen years. The congregation lost membership, worship attendance, and budget. St. Philip's also had a congregation dust up which saw many long-time members leave. Just before the pandemic we came together and had a congregation wide family discussion about change and our future. We started the process of turning things around and moving in a positive direction. Covid put a pause in our progress for sure, but now it's time to continue our positive movement. Change is difficult for everyone, but we must change if we want St. Philip's to continue.

We have an existential choice in front of us. If we keep doing things the way they have been done for many years the congregation will cease to exist in less than twelve years. It would mean the end of an incredible legacy handed down to us by many faithful people who build our faith community. The building would have to be sold and most likely it would be torn down and redeveloped as commercial property. The organ, the stained glass, the artwork, and even the memories would eventually be gone.

It doesn't have to be that way. We can choose to change and grow; change and live; change and serve to the glory of God. We have all of the necessary components for congregational renewal and growth. First, we need to be honest with each other and choose renewal. Next, we need to make some changes to how we do things. Our goal is to change not too fast and not too slow. We need to be fully committed to being followers of Christ. We need to make sure that the new folks can find their place here. We also need to have an overwhelming focus on service and outreach in our community.

You may ask, "What can I do?" The biggest and most important thing is prayer. We must all pray each and every day that God would renew St. Philip's. We must pray for changed hearts, open eyes to see God's path for us, and courage to go forward. I look forward to all the wonderful things God will do through St. Philip's in our lives and the lives of our community.

New Books in the Library

Several new books are winners of the Christy Award. This award was established in 1999 to acknowledge the value and impact of the novel of faith in contemporary culture. The awards go to writers who write from a perspective of faith. The following books are some of the recent winners.

The Secret Keepers of Old Depot by Amanda Cox. Revel/Baker, 2021. Cox explores the complexity of the mother-daughter dynamic, the way the secrets we keep shape our lives, and the healing power of telling the truth. Winner: Book of the Year.

Drawn By the Current by Jocelyn Green, Bethany House, 2022. In 1915, a birthday excursion turns deadly when the S.S. Eastland capsizes with Olive Pierce and her best friend on board. Hundreds perish, and Olive barely escapes. This is a story of sacrifice, protection, and redemption. Winner: Historical Fiction.

Shadow by Kara Swanson, Enclave Publishing, 2021. Peter Pan has crash-landed back on Neverland. But this is not the island he remembers. Desperate to rescue Claire, his twin sister, and the Lost Boys, Peter must unravel what tore Neverland apart. Winner: Young Adult.

Dust by Kara Swanson, Enclave Publishing, 2020. This book is a prequel to Shadow. The trouble with Neverland is that it is far more dangerous than a fairy tale. Claire believes the world is too dark for magic to be real. She's been looking for her twin brother Peter Pan, who was stolen away as a child.

Until Leaves Fall in Paris by Sarah Sundin, Revell, 2022. When the Nazis march toward Paris, American ballerina Lucie Girard buys her favorite English language bookstore to allow the Jewish owners to escape. She must keep Green Leaf Books open, though Germans make that difficult. She aids the Resistance by passing secret messages in the pages of her books. Winner: Historical Romance.

For Younger Readers

Patrick Wigglesworth's Bizarre Bible Adventure: Over My Head by Liz Hagler, Tyndall Kids, 2022. Fourth grader Patrick Wigglesworth finds himself in a faith-based adventure with Moses as his tour guide. A graphic novel.

I Am Not Afraid: Psalm 23 for Bedtime by Sandy Eisenberg, Beaming Books, 2023. A Child imagines scary shadows chasing away her sleep and peace as she reaches out to God her Comforter.

The Little Book of Joy by the Dalai Lama XIV and Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Crown Books, 2022. In this collaboration for children, His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Tutu created this book as a gift for young people everywhere.

Sarah Rising by Ty Chapman, Beaming Books, 2022. Inspired by the Minnesota uprising after the killing of George Floyd, this story follows a little African American girl attending a protest with her father and realizing that she has the power to protect what and whom she loves.

Spiritual Reading for Adults


Reading for the Love of God by Jessica Wilson, Brazos Press, 2023. The author shows how to reap the benefits of reading. The simple act of reading can help us learn to pray well, love our neighbor, be contemplative, practice humility, and distance ourselves from contemporary idols.

All Our Griefs to Bear by Joni Sancken, Herald Press, 2022. Church and Christian community look a lot different than they did before coronavirus hit. In addition to the pandemic, there is racial trauma and economic uncertainty. The author encourages church members to focus on resilience and compassion.

Beyond Welcome by Karen Gonzalez, Brazos Press, 2022. This book is for those who seek to welcome immigrants as a Christian response.

Food & Clothing Shelf

September 11 marked the 6th anniversary of the Food & Clothing Shelf. During those six years, The Food & Clothing Shelf has been open 1,250 days, volunteers work a total of 6,574 hours during the days open. 5,452 families have visited. 133,693 pounds of food has been distributed and 15,679 pounds of clothing has been distributed. The cost to keep the Food & Clothing Shelf stocked during the 6 years was \$127,668.07. No funds have been used out of the church budget (prior to closing during COVID \$300 was given from the general budget). Donations and grants given totaled \$142,624. Praise be to God for the sustaining financial support of this ministry. It truly takes a village. Though we continue to be financially stable the number of visits is rising dramatically. God willing, we will be able to meet the increasing needs of those in search of our help as we look forward to 2024.

The Legacy of Art at St. Philip's

Over the next few months, the Heritage Group would like to draw your attention to the various pieces of art that are displayed throughout the building. This month will focus on the three bronze sculptures in the Narthex.

Clem Coverston, a long-time member of St. Philip's, created the sculpture, "My Savior, My Shepherd" in 1996.


