News From Jim & Carol Sack

Dear Friends in Christ:

Once again, greetings from Tokyo. In Matthew 25:36 we read "I was in prison and you visited me." In this newsletter, we want to share a little about the experiences we have had as volunteers at the Fuchu Prison near our house in Tokyo. Carol serves as a counselor and has volunteered there for about 17 years. I function as a chaplain and have been going for about 15 years. We both ended up there by different routes, but have found this ministry to be extremely rewarding and meaningful. Even though the men we minister to are not Japanese, both Carol and I are convinced this is an important piece of our ministries in Japan. It provides the opportunity to share the Word of God with those who are lost.

We usually go separately and on different days. It is possible that both Carol and I will see some of the same foreign male prisoners. This is helpful because we both know about that prisoner and can more easily pray for them in our own private devotions. When we meet with them one-on-one, we are in a room by ourselves. A guard is outside the room and can see inside and observe what we are doing. The men we see may be Christian (both Catholic and Protestant), Islam, Buddhist, or no religion at all.

In my case, during our first session, I explain in detail who I am, the purpose of our meeting, and that they are the ones who control what we talk about. They know that our conversation is private information. The purpose is not evangelism, but to be a presence that cares about them and their lives, and who is willing to pray with them and read scripture if they so desire. About 95% of the men want prayers and Scripture. However, if they do not want that, we do not force that on them. There is complete privacy and we do not need to share with the prison what we have discussed with them. If there is some medical issue or problem they are facing, we get their permission to share that with the prison.

During one visit to the prison we can see up to 10 prisoners individually, each for 15 minutes. When the time is up, the guard will ring a bell, which indicates we need to finish up, and will then usually close with prayer. The time is for the prisoner and they may freely decide what to talk about. I usually decide ahead of time a couple of Scripture verses from which to read to them, and choose one of them depending on the content of our discussion. Since their opportunities to talk to someone one-on-one are very limited, they seem to relish the chance to have these 15 minutes with a listening ear. More than once we have been told that during their month, this short time with us is the most important time they have.

Many of these men are taking the time to establish a relationship with God and try to find ways to move into healthier and a more positive direction in their life. A few men indicate they are so happy to have been caught because they had been addicted to various things and this forced them to stop. A number of men have related that if they had not been put into prison, they probably would be dead by now. About 85% of the men have been charged with trying to smuggle drugs into Japan. Of course, this is nothing to be proud of, but having to spend a various number of years in prison (about 4-12) forces them to reflect on their crimes, reconsider their lives, and strive to get into better patterns of living. I have been so impressed by the great number of men who have taken up daily reading of Scripture and praying as ways to improve themselves. Many of these prisoners know a great deal of Scripture by the time they are released.

I also have been asked by five men to baptize them. With each of these prisoners, it was on their own initiative that their request was made. The first time, it took a few months to get permission from the prison to do that. However, after that, the prison has given me permission to freely baptize during our short 15-minute sessions. Interestingly, three of these men had been believers of Islam and wanted to convert to Christianity. In that case, I take a number of sessions to discuss with them why they want to change and to look together at the implications of changing their religion. Usually, Baptism is done in a communal context. I stress to them that doing it in prison is out of the ordinary, but once they are released they should find a church community to be part of and continue receiving and giving support. We pray that these men in prison may find the grace, joy, and forgiveness of being in a personal relationship with our Lord and Savior.

2024 Spring TripSt. Philip's Disaster Relief



Western Kentucky was struck by several tornadoes in December of 2021, affecting many communities. One of the tornadoes was on the ground for over 165 miles. Overall, the 190 mph winds killed 57 people and injured over 500. In Mayfield alone, more than 4,000 structures were impacted (damaged or destroyed).

The SPDR Ministry has tentatively set April 20 – 28, 2024 to travel to Mayfield, KY for a second time to assist in the rebuild efforts in the area. Additional trip and registration will be provided via E-News and the Friend in March 2024.

Due to the wonderful continued financial support, we will not be holding the SPDR fundraiser in February. We are extremely grateful for all those who have donated to SPDR in 2023 and have enabled the journey to continue. Thank you for your support of the SPDR Ministry.

Jotham Samwashe, our correspondent from our companion congregation, The Lutheran Church of Christ in Bille, Nigeria, sent this update on activities there:

"Greetings from me and LCCN Bille to all the members of St. Philip's Lutheran Church at Fridley, Minnesota, USA. We hope you are doing well in Jesus' name. Amen."

Report on the funds we have provided:

"Catechist/Evangelist Amos Antibas, who is at our joint outreach project, is doing fine with his family. We have not visited him this year, but will do so by the end of the rainy season by God's will. The work on their church is near completion."


"Nursery and primary school teachers, head teacher and nanny are paid regularly, likewise Catechist Amos Antebas at our joint outreach project. Nine students got scholarships for secondary school."

Other activities:

"We are working with Nigeria Bible Translation Trust (nbtt) in Jos, Nigeria, to translate the Holy Bible into Bille language, both written and oral. The women's fellowship hosted the women of Todi Diocese at their convention in Bille. The choir, gospel choir, boys brigade, the end 1, and Sunday School had their week-long annual activities at various times." [See pictures on the Global Missions Bulletin Board.]

Personal note and prayer request:

"Generally, we have a lot of hardship in Nigeria; change of bank notes during election, famine and removal of oil subsidy by the government, and late onset of rainfall couple with insecurities are making life difficult. Mr. Dah [our original contact] is doing well. My wife, Agnes, is battling with ulcer, pile, eye sight, BP and diabetes. Please pray for us and our country. We appreciate you all for your congregational support fund. May God bless you all. Amen."




The Legacy of Art at St. Philip's

Food & Clothing Shelf

With each month passing we continue to see unprecedented increases in visitors to the Food & Clothing Shelf. You may be asking why so many people are need of food assistance.

1.) Costs of Essentials Remain at Elevated Levels, and Wages are not Keeping Up.

Gas, groceries, and rent continue to be high and while not too much of a problem for the wealthy it is unbearable for those with lower or no income.

2.) Another Round of COVID-Era Programs Has Ended

Following the end of Emergency SNAP (E-SNAP) benefits this spring, families are continuing to feel the strain of increased food costs. Research has come out quantifying the devastating impact of losing these essential grocery benefits. Researchers at the University of Pennsylvania estimated that the end of E-SNAP was connected with a 21% increase in the experience of food insufficiency among SNAP-participating households. In Minnesota, over 235,000 households saw a cut to their SNAP benefits.

3.) More Debt and Less Savings

What you can do to support those facing food insecurity as we continue to navigate historic levels of hunger:

- Advocate for policies and programs that will bring meaningful solutions.
- Volunteer to fight hunger in your local community.
- Donate financially to causes addressing barriers and inequities, including our work of feeding and clothing those in need together.
