## Growth in the New Year Eric Nelson, Pastor

Often the new year begins with resolutions and hopes for good things to come. We often take part in this in our home as well, setting new goals for the year, aiming to make improvements for the sake of better living.

All these are good things, but I think there is an additional dimension we can add to our new year goals and resolutions. Instead of simply exercising more, eating out less, or whatever other good personal goals can be achieved we can also name additional purposes alongside those goals that look outward: exercising more so one can be more active and present with family and friends, eating out less in order to use those funds to feed others, taking time for sabbath and rest so one can bring their full self to family and work.

Each of us is important enough that this self-care and improvement matters. But, similar to our freedom from sin which allows us to do the good things God calls us to do, we can use these self-improvements to bring goodness around us.

We may have so many questions that remain bigger than ourselves and our understandings, but as we grow in personal goals and discipleship we can be better equipped to follow and trust that God will work well with the gifts God has given us to share with our neighbors.

I pray growth for you in another new year, knowing God's love and purpose for you in any season and trusting that our work as disciples matters for the good of God's people and world.

### W. Kentucky and Middle Tennessee Natural Disasters

St. Philip's Disaster Relief



For the past several years, western Kentucky and middle Tennessee have been in the bullseye for natural disasters - the 2010 Nashville flood, the 2016 Gatlinburg fire, and the 2020 Nashville/Cookeville tornadoes to name a few.

More recently, in August 2021, 17" of rain caused a major flash flood in Waverly, TN resulting in 22 deaths and creating millions of dollars in damage. In 2022-2023, the SPDR ministry sent three teams to Waverly to assist in the rebuilding.

On December 10, 2021, western Kentucky was struck by several tornadoes, affecting many communities. One of the tornadoes was on the ground for over 165 miles. Overall, the 190 mph winds caused the death of 57 people and injured over 500. In Mayfield alone, more than 4,000 structures were damaged or destroyed. The SPDR ministry sent a team to Mayfield in October 2023 to assist in the rebuilding and in April 2024, another team will be dispatched to the Mayfield area to continue to assist.

Just a couple of weeks ago, on December 9th, six tornadoes struck Tennessee. One of the funnels, 600 yards wide and traveling for 11 miles, destroyed many homes and businesses in the Clarksville, TN area, about 50 miles northwest of Nashville, and Hendersonville, a northeast suburb of Nashville. Six individuals died. The SPDR ministry has donated \$2,000, through Thrivent Financial, to Inspiritus Disaster Relief Services to provide long-term recovery assistance for those impacted by these tornadoes. Thrivent added a 50% match, making this donation \$3,000 total.

Of interest, all these locations are within a 100-mile radius of each other. Please keep our neighbors in this region in your prayers.

SPDR has set April 20 - 28, 2024 as dates for a second trip to Mayfield, KY to continue to assist in the rebuilding efforts in the area. SPDR has been communicating with the Tennessee United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) concerning registration, jobs, and team lodging for the April trip. Additional trip and registration information will be provided via E-News and the *Friend* in March 2024.


## The Legacy of Art at St. Philip's

Spence also created a table used for funerals, the wooden urn box and a box mounted on the wall in the narthex that safely holds funeral cards and memorials.
















## New Books in the Library!

- 1. Dear Jacob: A Mother's Journey of Hope by Patty Wetterling. On October 22, 1989, in the small town of St Joseph, MN, 11-year-old Jacob Wetterling was kidnapped at gunpoint. Twenty-seven years later Danny Heinrich led authorities to the boy's remains. Between those two dates is the story of the search for Jacob led by his mother Patty.
- 2. The First Ladies by Victoria Christopher Murray. In this historical novel, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt and civil rights activist Mary McLeod Bethune form an unlikely friendship that changed the world.
- 3. Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate. In 1939 Rill Foss and her four younger siblings are taken from their parents' Mississippi River shantyboat and delivered to the Tennessee Children's Home Society orphanage. Rill fights to keep them together. In present day South Carolina. Avery Stafford, a wealthy and successful federal prosecutor, is forced to take a journey through her family's hidden history.
- 4. Skipping Christmas by John Grisham. Imagine a year without Christmas. No crowded shopping malls, no parties, and no unwanted presents. That is just what Luther and Nora Krank decide to do just this once. No house decorations, no Christmas tree. They won't need one because this year on December 25th they are headed on a Caribbean Cruise. But this couple is about to discover it isn't as easy as it sounds.
- 5. The Lore of Uncle Fogy by Clarence Tolg. Reminiscences as told to Allen Gray, Munsingwear, WCCO Radio, 1971. Philosophy and some practical advice from a Fine Old Gentleman.
- 6. The Dutch House by Ann Patchett. At the end of WWII, Cyril Conroy combines luck and a single investment to begin an enormous real estate empire propelling his family from poverty to enormous wealth. His first order of business is to buy the Dutch House, a lavish estate in the suburbs of Philadelphia. Meant as a surprise for his wife, the house sets in motion the undoing of everyone he loves. Cyril's son, Danny and his sister Maeve, are exiled from the house by their stepmother and back into poverty. They find all they have to count on is each other.
- 7. The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse by Charlie Mackesy. A modern illustrated fable for all ages that explores life's universal lessons. Hand-printed graphic, "Soldatenmarsch" (2nd movement from Robert Schumann's "Album fur die jungend') is printed on the endpapers.
- 8. Voices in the Stones: Life Lessons from the Native Way by Kent Nerburn. The genius of the Native Americans has always been their spirituality and their deep understanding of the land and its ways. For three decades author Kent Nerburn has lived and worked among the Native American people. This book is an unique collection of his encounters, experiences, and reflections during that time.
- 9. Small Great Things by Jodi Picoult. Ruth Jefferson is a black experienced labor and delivery nurse. When a white couple refuses to have her attend to their white baby, it changes her career and her life forever. The issue of race dominates the novel.
- 10. Footprints in Courage by Kristin Gilpatrick. A Bataan Death March survivor's story told by Army Air Corps staff Sergeant Alf Larson was one of 7,500 American servicemen whose courageous and tortured footprints mark the bloody pages of WWII history as participants in the infamous week-long forced hike that became known as The Bataan Death March.


