Welcome God as He Comes to Us Matt Flom, Pastor

23 But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him. 24 God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth.'

John 4:23-24

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

Grace, love, and peace be to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. There are seven purposes of the Christian church. Service, Evangelism, and Fellowship connect us with each other. Stewardship, Discipleship, and Sabbath connect us with God. Worship brings it all together. Worship is the most visible and it is often what people think of first when they talk about church, but sadly it may well be the most poorly understood purpose of the church.

The spirits of our modern consumerist commercial world teach us that life is all about us. We are taught that what we consume and what we partake in should be oriented toward our likes, our tastes, and our moods. Sadly, we often let this spirit into our worship life. When we let the spirits of the world dictate our worship life, we lose connection with God and his divine presence. Yet despite this, we still yearn for an encounter with the divine. Our soul seeks to find God in worship. This is why mega churches gather a lot of people for concert-style worship services, but many people don't stay connected or grow in their faith. For a long time, there was a popular theology of worship called entertainment evangelism. The idea was to have the most professional and entertaining services to draw people in. Then the congregation could tell them about Jesus. People came for the show but never became growing disciples of Jesus.

If we are to connect with God's Holy Spirit in our worship, we must let go of ourselves and welcome God as he comes to us. Worship means for us to offer praise and adoration towards God. In worship, we receive Christ, God's living Word, in music, reading, preaching, and the sacraments. Worship is not a passive time of just listening or watching, like going to a concert. It is an active work that we do together. In fact, liturgy comes from the ancient words for the work of the people. Offering praise and adoration to God puts us in the proper perspective to apprehend the presence of God's Holy Spirit. Jesus said, "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." (John 12:32) The word for lifted up means not only to hold up, but to glorify. Our worship should be about glorifying God and inviting others to meet God's Holy Spirit. In this way our souls will be fed, our hearts will be moved, and we will serve God by building up his kingdom. Let us worship God in spirit and truth.

On December 10, 2021, an EF4 tornado moved across Western Kentucky, causing severe damage in numerous towns, including Mayfield (pop. 10,000) and taking 57 lives. 4,000 structures in Mayfield were damaged or destroyed. A St. Philip's Disaster Relief team will travel to and work in the Mayfield, KY area from April 20 - April 28, assisting tornado survivors help rebuild their homes and lives.

Food & Clothing Shelf

With the unprecedented increase in food shelf visits, St. Philip's Food & Clothing Shelf has been hit hard as we try to maintain our food inventory to keep up with the demand. The majority of donations to keep our food & clothing shelf in the black comes from donations from members of our church. We purchase 95% of our food from 2nd Harvest Heartland and purchase new socks and underwear for our clothing department as needed. With the rise in visitors and price increases from our food supplier, 2nd Harvest Heartland, we are nearing a point where we will be unable to sustain the increases using our current visitor allowance of two bags of food and one bag of clothing.

In 2023 grants covered the shortfall in donations. Plans are in the works to secure support grants for 2024 in hopes of covering any donation shortfalls to the projected costs anticipated in 2024. Without which we will be forced to adopt a lesser food & clothing shelf model of giving to those in need.

Update from Tokyo Jim and Carol Sack

Dear Sponsoring Congregations:

We once again send greetings from Japan. This coming academic year (April 2024 to March2025) will be our final year to serve as missionaries. Jim officially had to retire from the school at the end of the 2022 academic year, since he was over 70. However, the school has asked him to remain an additional two years to teach. Likewise, Carol continues to teach as well. After retirement, we will remain in Japan and live in a place called Nagano Prefecture where the 1998 Winter Olympics were held. We have had the honor to live and work in Japan as missionaries, much due to the financial and spiritual support we have continued to receive from you all. For that, we can only say a big "arigato gozaimasu (thank you)." This coming summer will be our last home leave assignment back in the States. We will be visiting as many sponsoring congregations as possible in the two months we will be there. If you would like us to visit your congregation can you please indicate which of the following dates would be good for you? It would be helpful if you could give us at least two dates, as we have more congregations than open Sundays and there may be more than one request for a particular Sunday. If it is possible to get your requests by March 25, 2024, then we will make out a master schedule and respond to you by the first week of April about the date of our visit with your congregation.

As in the past, ELCA policy asks congregations that host a visit from missionaries, to provide lodging and travel expenses for that visit. In the past, we have been lodged in members' homes and have stayed in motels. Either of these is just fine. The congregation is also expected to pay for travel costs en route. In the past, an average visit to a congregation has been approximately \$200-250. One method that has worked very well is to take up a "freewill" offering at the service. Even if we do not receive enough to cover expenses, that is not a problem as we can also cover part of that personally. In the past, God has always graciously provided enough funds to be able to do this. We do hope and pray that we will be able to see you once more before we finish our careers as missionaries. We have consistently received so much support and prayers from our sponsoring congregations over the 40+ years we have served in Japan. We have a great deal of gratitude for you all from the bottom of our hearts. Thank you again for being in relationship with us and helping to plant seeds in Japan for the Kingdom of God. It has been a privilege to know you.

In 2024, we still will be sending out newsletters to you. Today we are having the ordination of 4 new pastors who have graduated from the seminary. In the next newsletter or two, we want to introduce you to a couple of these new servants for Christ.

May the rest of your Lenten journey be meaningful, and may you experience the overwhelming joy that God offers us at Easter!!

The Legacy of Art at St. Philip's series this month draws your attention to the various quilt banners that are displayed throughout the building. We went to the experts to learn more.

Quilts in Fellowship Hall

Joan Kruse and Becky Becker both found inspiration with the stained-glass windows in the Sanctuary and hallways. Joan drafted an original pattern which was used to make the quilts. Both Joan and Becky made the colorful panels, Joan added the sashing and borders and after being professionally quilted, they were bound and labeled. The project was completed and installed in the spring of 2011.



Village Quilt by Door 3

Joan Kruse made this story quilt. Originally it was displayed in Fellowship Hall. Funny story there – St. Philip's is a polling site. During one election, a woman was upset because the wording is the title of a 1996 book by Hillary Clinton. This woman thought it was inappropriate to have it hung in a polling site. To resolve the issue, the quilt was flipped up so the words were not visible.



Colorful Quilt by Door 3

Becky Becker made this quilt in 2014. She was inspired by a pattern found in a quilting magazine. Its title comes from Genesis 1:3 *And God said, "Let there be Light".* Many people coming to the Food & Clothing Shelf have commented on how pretty it is. It's in a perfect location!

Joan Kruse and Becky Becker both worked on this quilt while on a quilt retreat in 2012. They report that it is not always easy for two people to make one quilt, but they made it work and the result is beautiful! It was originally hung in Fellowship Hall but was moved when the sound panels were installed.
