Who Knew? Heritage Group

The Heritage Group visited with Richard Harris on October 8, 2024. Richard and his wife Laurel became members of St. Philip's in 1967. Two daughters attended Sunday school and confirmation at St. Philip's and graduated from Fridley school district. Laurel died on April 17, 2024, and her funeral was held at St. Philip's on April 26. What Pastor Matt learned from Richard at the funeral was that Richard was involved in the construction of our new Sanctuary!

Richard's father had started a welding company in Fridley after a stint with the US Navy as a welder. Richard followed in his father's footsteps, learning to weld from an early age, joining the navy after high school, and joining his family's welding company after graduating from the U of MN with a degree in engineering.


In 1965, the company was working with Northern Ordinance (FMC). After the 1965 tornado, they helped with the search and rescue operation. The company owned and operated the type of equipment needed to lift heavy pieces of debris.

In the spring of 1965, the congregation of St. Philip's had made the decision to build a new and larger Sanctuary. Harold Spitznagel and Associates of Sioux Falls, South Dakota was hired to design the new Sanctuary. Henry O. Mikkelson Company of Minneapolis was the General Contractor.


The new Sanctuary would be large at 6,758 square feet and a height of 48 feet. To support this expanse, the architect's design called for six beams, supported by six columns around the perimeter of the building, coming together in a circle at the top, using a tension ring / compression ring construction method.

Weyerhaeuser provided the wooden beams. They were made in Tacoma, Washington and shipped to Fridley by rail. It took two weeks to ship by special cars on special tracks and was very costly. Manufacture time for the beams was three-four months. The beams were assembled in layers of Douglas fir and southern yellow pine and glued together.

2025 Spring Trip St. Philip's Disaster Relief



The area west of Nashville that stretches about 100 miles has been an area hard hit by tornados and floods for the past 3-4 years. SPDR teams have traveled to Waverly, KY three times, Mayfield, TN twice and Clarksville, TN once to assist in the rebuild following natural disaster events. The journey to this area continues. A SPDR Ministry Team tentatively plans to return to Clarksville next spring to continue our work in the area. In a few weeks we will begin coordination with our partners, the United Methodist Committee on Relief or UMCOR for trip preparation. The trip is tentatively scheduled for April 26 thru May 4. Update from Tokyo Jim and Carol Sack

This past summer when we were back in the States for "Home Leave," we were able to make direct contact with 7 of our congregations. Each and every week we had very meaningful time with those congregations and the people who worshipped that week! We want to thank you for those special times we were able to experience. In March of 2024, we had four seminary students graduate from the school. In this newsletter and another one I will be writing soon, we would like to introduce you to two of the graduates and share their backgrounds.

Very often these Christians have grown up in non-Christian homes and yet the Lord has found different ways to seek after them and inspire them to become pastors. In this letter we want to introduce you to Rev. Mariko Miura.

As an only child, Mariko was brought up in a home where the parents were not Christian. Her grandparents were also close by and she had frequent contact with them. The first time she encountered Christianity was when she went to Kyushu Jogakuin, a Lutheran school which was originally established as a girl's HS in 1926. When she was an 8th grade student her parents divorced and the father left the home. Many of the Christian teachers at the school were worried about Mariko since her grades suddenly became worse after the divorce. One of the teachers invited her to attend a worship service at a local Lutheran Church. The church felt like a warm family to Mariko, and she would often attend worship.

When she was a junior in high school, she became an exchange student in Australia. Upon her return to Japan as a Senior, she decided to become baptized. After that she attended and graduated from the International Christian University in Tokyo, which provided her with many wonderful experiences. Upon graduation she worked in Tokyo for a couple of years until her mother's cancer returned and her mother was only given one month to live. Mariko quickly quit her job and returned to be with her mother, which made her mother very happy. Because of unavoidable circumstances Mariko had to be separated at the time of death, but she was able to say goodbye over the phone. Mariko felt a great sense of loss, and began to doubt God and questioned whether she really had faith. She mailed one of the pastors and expressed her doubts to the pastor. This was the start of a new road for her.

Even though she did not have much joy or faith, she would sometimes attend church and there she saw many others who did have faith and seemed to be quite joyful. After her mother's death, for about 7 years she suffered regret. She prayed to God, that God would guide her, and she found some consolation and knew she was not alone. From the pastor, Mariko learned about the seminary, and even though she didn't think about becoming a pastor at that time, she knew she would be able to study theology. In 2019 she entered the seminary and gradually over time felt the call from God to become a pastor, and experienced God's power and leading.

It was at this point that she felt the desire to share with others what God had given to her. During her time at the seminary she met many faithful Christians who supported and encouraged her. Many from her school back home also prayed for her and supported her. Before starting her last year at the seminary, her grandmother and grandfather were both becoming quite old and feeble. She decided to take a leave of absence to be with them and help them in their final days. She was able to be with them at their times of death and felt the strong guidance of God through that experience.

Mariko then returned to the seminary and completed her final year and was ordained as a pastor in the Japan Evangelical Lutheran Church in March of this year. Currently Rev. Mariko Miura is serving as a pastor at two churches in the Tokai district, a couple of hours from Tokyo. Please give thanks to God for Rev. Miura and pray for her ministry as an ordained pastor.


