

GROW & WORSHIP

Happy New Year! Eric Nelson, Pastor

Often, we look to start into new and improved practices in the year, setting resolutions for all sorts of personal improvement. Times like the change of year is a wonderful time for this, but sometimes we forget that we are called to a sort of redirection constantly in life. As Martin Luther explains baptism in the Small Catechism, he shares meaningful words about how our one baptism for the forgiveness of sins is lived out each day anew. Luther says:

What then is the significance of such a baptism with water?

It signifies that the old person in us with all sins and evil desires is to be drowned and to die through daily sorrow for sin and through repentance, and on the other hand that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

At times we look to our forgiveness of sins only pertaining to the end of this life and our entrance to the next as we join Jesus in the heavenly kingdom with no more sin, pain, and death. Those promises should not be forgotten, but they can make us forget about our new life now. As we wake each morning, we die daily to sin so we can rise anew with Christ living in us. Some will remember their baptism each morning as they shower or wash their face. It is not a re-baptism, but a reminder of the new life we are called to live in.

Because when we remember this wonderful promise, life looks different. When we remember who we belong to and how God's ways are meant to be our ways, each day with the same patterns can take on new meaning for ourselves and for all of those around us.

Yes, there will be days when the old sinful self seems to rise up once again just moments after we remember this baptismal promise. So, we pause and remember again. We confess our sins to God. We apologize to those we might harm and then we get up again, ready to walk anew in the steps of our loving God.

We don't need to wait 365 days to hit the reset button. We are called each day and each moment to live anew in Christ's promises of forgiveness and newness of life.

So perhaps this new year, instead of choosing a resolution that will be void by the end of the month, we make a practice of remembering this baptismal promise more often so we can carry the love and grace of Christ more freely in our daily lives.

And when we miss a day, when we forget, when we see our old ugly habits rearing their head... we remember the grace of Christ and the promise in which we are baptized and we stand up again, admit our faults, and thank God for new life once again as we share Christ's love and grace.

May you remember God's love and grace in this new year. May you remember your baptism daily. May you know that hope for new life in Christ is present and alive in each moment. Let us live and share the good news.


Happy 2025 from the Heritage Group.





Since COVID, SPDR teams have traveled to Waverly, KY three times, twice to Mayfield, TN, and once to Clarksville, TN to assist in the rebuild following floods and tornadoes. The journey will continue to Clarksville. A SPDR Ministry Team tentatively plans to return to Clarksville next spring to continue our work. In a few weeks we will begin coordination with our partners, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) for trip preparation. Right now, the trip is scheduled for April 26 - May 4. New Books in the Library!

- 1. A Little More Like Jesus: all aboard for the fruits of the spirit by Zach Williams. We are called to be more like Jesus, but it can be hard to know what that means. In this book from Christian Music artist Zach Williams, kids join an exciting bus trip to discover fruits of the Spirit and learn how showing more love, patience, kindness, gentleness, and self-control can make a big difference.
- 2. Family Time by Grady Nutt. This book was created to encourage families to spend more time together.
- 3. Snow by Cynthia Rylant. The author celebrates the beauty of a snowfall and its happy effect on children.
- 4. Listening for God: Contemporary Literature and the Life of Faith by various authors. In this collection of stories, the challenge is to listen for God everywhere. Life and faith merge in surprising ways.
- 5. The Seed Keeper by Diane Wilson. A haunting novel spanning several generations. "The Seed Keeper" follows a Dakota family's struggle to preserve their way of life and their sacrifices to protect what matters most.
- 6. 100 Flowers and How They Got Their Names by Diane Wells From Baby Blue Eyes to Silver Bells, from Abelia to Zinnia, every flower tells a story. The author presents 100 garden favorites and the stories behind their names.
- 7. Isaac's Storm: a Man, a Time, and the Deadliest Hurricane in Human History. On September 8, 1900, Isaac Cline, meteorologist in Galveston, Texas, failed to recognize the seriousness of the deep-sea swells and winds that greeted the city. Based on the diaries of Isaac Monroe Cline and contemporary accounts.
- 8. Man o' War by Cory McCarthy. This is a coming-of-age story that follows the journey of an Irish Lebanese American trans teen navigating challenges and joys of self-discovery. What follows is a wrenching journey of self-discovery. It is candid and emotional and is intended for older teens and adults. This novel is a "Read Brave St. Paul" selection recommended by the St. Paul Public Library. Read Brave St. Paul is an annual city-wide book club hosted by Mayor Melvin Carter and the St. Paul Public Library.
- 9. The Devil in the White City: murder, magic, and madness at the fair that changed America by Erik Larson. The author paints a picture of the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago and two men, the architect behind the World's Fair and a cunning serial killer.

Update from Tokyo Jim and Carol Sack

As I promised when I recently sent you another newsletter, I want to present to you one more recent seminary graduate. Today's pastor is the Rev. David Nelson, the son of ELCA missionaries who served here as career missionaries. It is unusual to have a foreigner become a JELC (Japan Evangelical Lutheran Church) pastor, and not a missionary sent from the States like we are. He was ordained along with three other graduates in March of this year.

David's parents served a number of congregations here in Japan in their long career. David was born in Hamamatsu, relatively close to Mt. Fuji. He lived there until he was four and then returned to the States in St. Paul for one year while his parents were on "Home Assignment." After that the family moved to the snowy north part of Japan on the large island of Hokkaido, to the city of Sapporo. He attended the very small Hokkaido International School, which only had 5-6 students at that time.

For high school he lived in a dorm in Tokyo and attended the American School in Japan. Upon graduation he went to the States and spent one year in the Seattle Bible Institute. It was here that he developed a great interest in the idea of "tentmaking," the concept of having a job while also doing intentional Gospel sowing in the community. After that year he finished up his college education at St. Olaf College, and then on to Columbia University Law School. When this study ended, he stayed in NY and worked for 3 years at a law firm. After a while, when David was 28 he was recruited to work in another firm in Tokyo. He has been in Japan ever since. He met his wife Yoko who was a nurse, at the church they both attended. They have raised three children whom all are now in their twenties and working in the States. The influence of his earlier idea of tentmaking came back to him and he took early retirement at age 57 and enrolled in a 2-year course to study theology at the seminary. During those two years he felt the call from God to become a pastor. During this time he did some volunteer work teaching English at one of the JELC churches, along with other volunteer activities. He wanted to be a pastor of the JELC, but did not know if that was possible, since he was not a Japanese citizen. However, the church leadership was eager to have David become one of their pastors.

Rev. David Nelson

In March, Rev. David Nelson was ordained as a minister of the JELC and currently serving two churches in the southern-most island of Kyushu. The two churches are separated by a 3 hour drive one way, but Rev. Nelson is thankful to be able to serve both churches, even though it makes for a long weekend. Rev. Nelson's journey to become a pastor of the Japanese church is a unique one, but shows that we all are one in Christ. It also is a testimony to the effort and work he put in to study entirely in the Japanese language, graduate from the seminary and now serve along many Japanese colleagues for the JELC. I want to praise God for David and his ministry. Please pray for Rev. Nelson, his ministry, and his family. In addition, prayers for all the JELC pastors, their congregations, and their ministries would be much appreciated. We would like to ask for your prayers as well, as this is our last year of ministry in Japan. We have mentioned earlier that we will be retiring in Japan in 2025.
